This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of requisites for sports and athletics.

The aggregate amount of wages paid by firms furnishing returns of wages was $£ 496,000$ in 1935 representing $47 \cdot 3$ per cent. of the net output of these firms, the corresponding figures for 1930 being $£ 408,000$ and 56.6 per cent. The figures for these firms given below indicate the size of the sample and the extent to which it is representative.
