THIS REPORT on the Brushes and Brooms Industry, relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of brushes and brooms, in preparing animal hair for brushmaking. and in dressing bristles and fibres for all purposes.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 192 in the Standard Industrial Classification.
