## CUTLERY TRADE

THIS REPORT on the Cutlery Trade relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of knives, scissors, razors (not electric), razor blades, manicure sets, other cutlers manufacture of knives, scissors, razors (not electric), razor
wares and table forks and spoons of steel (not silver-plated)

This trade corresponds to minimum list heading $90(2)$ in the Standard Industrial Classification.
There were no larger establishments in Northern Ireland in the register for this trade.
