This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the

manufacture of wooden furniture, bedding and cushions and in the making-up of carpets, curtains, draperies, etc.

As quantitative particulars are not available, except for a limited number of classes of goods produced in 1935, Table VI dealing with average values of goods produced, exported and imported is not included for this trade.
