## The Report on the Census of Production for 1954

STEEL SHEETS

THIS REPORT on the Steel Sheets Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainl in the rolling from the bar or slab of steel sheets and the production of coated sheets, including galvanized sheets (flat or corrugated). The rolling from the bar or slab of tin, terne and black plate, tinned sheets and terne sheets are excluded and are included in the report on the Tinplate Industry (Volume 3. Industry E)

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 43 (1) in the Standard Industrial
Classification.
There were no larger establishments in Northern Ireland in the register for this industry

Standard Industrial Classification. Certain products are identified as the principal products of individual industries. the principal products for a given industry
being of a sinilar nature or commonil absociated in production. The principle of classification normally
followed is that an ostablishment is classified to an dustry if its output of the principal products of that
dustry accounted for a greater proportion of the value of principal pro-
of its output than did its its output of the priter industry. Specialist producers normally comprise those establish-
ments so per cent or more of whe total output by value is accounted for
