

PART A

BUILDING AND CONTRACTING

THIS REPORT on the Building and Contracting Industry relates to private firms engaged wholly or mainly on work of construction, alteration, repair and maintenance of buildings, highways, airfields, sewers, waterworks, harbours and canals; electric wiring, heating and other installation work; opencast coal prospecting and mining; non-electrical work at power stations and on telegraph and telephone lines and television cables and other civil engineering work. It covers work of these kinds carried out on their own account by firms engaged in other industries which maintained separate works departments (e.g. for erection, maintenance and repair of their own premises); it also covers work of these kinds carried out by Government Departments which employed direct labour.

This industry corresponds to minimum list headings 200(1), part of 200(3) (Building), 201 (Electric Wiring) and part of 202 (Civil Engineering) in the Standard Industrial Classification.

The Ministry of Fuel and Power (Directorate of Opencast Coal Production) transferred responsibility for opencast coal prospecting and mining to the National Coal Board in March, 1952. Consequently, 1951 figures are shown in Table 5(1)(A) (Government Departments) and 1954 figures are included in Table 5(1)(A) (Private Firms).

Firms in 1951 and 1954 that employed 25 or more persons on the average were required to give detailed information on employment, wages and salaries, plant, machinery and vehicles, the usage of certain specified materials and work carried out. Firms employing from 11-24 persons on the average provided only basic figures on employment, wages and salaries, materials and fuel used and work carried out. In 1954, firms employing ten or fewer persons provided only basic figures on employment and work carried out, in 1951 these small firms also provided information on wages and salaries and materials and fuel used.

All firms, except in 1948 firms employing 10 or fewer persons, distinguished in their returns between work which they carried out as main contractors and sub-contractors respectively. Main contract work was to be valued inclusive of any work sub-contracted. Consequently, there is duplication in the gross output figures to the extent that such sub-contract work was carried out for main contractors who made returns in this industry.

The output of Government Departments was in general valued at cost i.e. at sums calculated to cover materials used and wages and salaries paid, together with the establishment charges properly attributable to the work carried out. Particulars relating to Government Departments in Northern Ireland are included with those for private firms.

The building and civil engineering establishments of Local Authorities and constructional work carried out by establishments which were also engaged in the manufacture of structural iron and steelwork, tubular scaffolding or prefabricated houses of steel or aluminium, are the subject of separate reports (Local Authorities (Building and Civil Engineering) - Volume 12, Industry B; and Constructional Engineering - Volume 4, Industry F).

Except for Table 1 which includes estimates for the Hospital Authorities (Building and Civil Engineering) Industry, the tables in Part A relate only to the Building and Contracting Industry; those in Part B relate to Hospital Authorities (Building and Civil Engineering). A separate preamble to Part B is given on page 12/A/21,

Details of the value of all construction, repair and maintenance carried out during 1954 by private firms, Government Departments, Local Authorities, Hospital Authorities and Public Utility Services are shown in the Appendix to this report on page 12/A/26.

Appendix - Value of all building and civil engineering work done in 1954, including output returned in industries other than the Building and Contracting Industry.

IMPORTANT NOTES and definitions appear on the next page. In interpreting the data in the tables, it is essential to bear these in mind.

The following notes describe terms in general use ing oil, gas and electricity) for all purposes: in the tables of the report. More detailed explanations of the terms used and a description of the scope and method of taking the census are given in the separate booklet entitled 'The Report on the Census of Production for 1954 - Introductory Notes' (price 1s. 6d.

Industrial Classification: Establishments are classified to industries according to the nature of their output and, as far as possible, in conformity with the Standard Industrial Classification. Certain products are identified as the principal products of individual industries, the principal products for a given industry being of a similar nature or commonly associated in production. The principle of classification normally followed is that an establishment is classified to an industry if its output of the principal products of that industry accounted for a greater proportion of the value of its output than did its output of the principal products of any other industry.

Specialist producers normally comprise those establishments 50 per cent. or more of whose total output by value is accounted for by the characteristic products of the specialist group.

Intermediate products: For some industries figures are given showing the total quantities made during the year of intermediate products, i.e., products which may be further processed in the establishments in which they

Larger establishments: The information given in the report relates mainly to 'larger establishments', i.e., establishments of firms employing on the average more than 10 persons. In most cases an establishment comprises the whole of the premises under the same ownership or management at a particular address (e.g., a mine or factory). Offices, warehouses, laboratories and other ancillary places of business situated apart from the producing works are not regarded as separate establishments and are included in the return for the works.

Small firms are those employing on the average 10 or fewer persons. .

The estimates for the industry as a whole given in Table 1 are normally obtained by increasing the other items shown in the same proportion as total employment.

Gross output (production) is the total value of goods made and other work done during the year: it is obtained by adjusting the value of sales and work done during the year for changes in the value of stocks of products on hand for sale and work in progress.

Net output is the amount left after deducting from the value of gross output the aggregate of the cost of materials and fuel used, the amount paid for work given out, and, for 1951 and 1954, any transport payments made. This represents the value added to materials by the process of production, and constitutes the fund from which wages, salaries, rents, rates and taxes, advertising and other selling expenses and all other similar charges have to be met, as well as depreciation and profits.

Sales means sales during the year of goods made in the establishment covered by the return or made on commission for it, whether produced in the year or not. The value of sales is the net selling value, i.e., the amount charged to customers, whether on an ex-works or delivered basis, and net of any trade discounts, agents' commissions, allowances for returnable cases, purchase tax, etc. For goods charged on a delivered basis to customers overseas, firms were required to give the f.o.b. value.

Materials and fuel: The total cost of materials and fuel purchased includes all purchases during the year of materials for use in production, and of fuel (includmaterials, including the full cost of returnable cases when first purchased; workshop and office materials; water charges; materials for repairs to buildings. plant and vehicles when carried out by firms' own workpeople included in their returns; consumable tools; and parts for machinery purchased as replacements. Purchases of goods for merchanting are excluded. The cost of materials and fuel used, given in Table 2, is obtained by adjusting purchases for changes during the year in the value of stocks.

Stocks: Firms were required to give stocks of materials and fuel, products on hand for sale, and work in progress, at income tax values.

Customs and Excise Duty paid on materials purchased is normally included in the cost of materials. Finished goods are similarly valued as they were sold, duty-paid or duty-free. The net amount of any duty paid is deducted in arriving at net output.

Employment: Total employment includes working proprietors, administrative, technical and clerical employees. and operatives, but excludes outworkers, canteen employees and persons engaged in merchanting or any other activity not covered by a firm's return, the are shown separately as excluded employees. Employees are persons on the pay-roll (i.e., persons whose National Insurance cards were held by employers), whether employed full-time or part-time.

Working proprietors are proprietors of businesses other than limited companies, together with members of their families who worked in the business without receiving fixed wages or salaries. Any persons working less than half the normal hours are excluded. For Northern Ireland directors of limited companies (other than those paid by fee only) are also included.

Administrative, technical and clerical employees include directors, other than those paid by fee only (except in Northern Ireland); managers, superintendents and works foremen; research, experimental, development, technical and design employees (other than operatives); draughtsmen and tracers; travellers; and office (including works office) employees.

Operatives include all other classes of employees, i.e., broadly speaking, all manual workers.

Outworkers are persons employed by the firm who work on materials supplied by the firm in their own homes.

Wages and salaries include all overtime payments, bonuses and commissions without any deductions for income tax. insurances, contributory pensions etc. They exclude payments to working proprietors.

Capital expenditure includes expenditure on new building work, and on plant, machinery and vehicles, charged to capital account during the year, including any transport and installation costs involved. It includes expenditure in respect of establishments in Great Britain which had not begun production before the end of the year (which has not previously been included in the Census of Production reports for individual industries).

Where figures are rounded, e.g., given to the nearest £ thousand, there may be apparent slight discrepancies between the sums of constituent items and the totals shown. HOSPITAL AUTHORITIES (BUILDING AND CIVIL ENGINEERING)

THIS REPORT relates to the work of building construction, repair and renewal, and civil engineering work carried out by persons in the direct employment of Regional Hospital Boards, Hospital Management Committees and Boards of Management and Boards of Governors of teaching hospitals in Great

This industry corresponds to part of minimum list heading 200(3) (Building) and part of 202(2) (Civil Engineering) in the Standard Industrial Classification.

On the 5th July, 1948, most hospitals in Great Britain came under the administration of the new Hospital Boards and Committees set up under the National Health Service Acts of 1946 and 1947. For 1948, as regards hospitals formerly administrated by Local Authorities, building and civil engineering work carried out by directly employed labour was in a few cases, included by the local authority in its return in the Local Authorities (Building and Civil Engineering) Industry. Hospital Authorities were not required to make returns for 1949 and building and civil engineering was excluded from the scope of the census for 1950. 1951, therefore, is the first year for which separate information was collected from Regional Hospital Boards, Hospital Management Committees and Boards of Management and Boards of Governors for teaching hospitals.

This report does not include any work done on behalf of hospitals by contractors. Particulars of work furnished by contractors are included in the reports on the industries concerned.

Certain maintenance workers (e.g., boilermen, liftmen, cleaners, gardeners and porters) and the work done by them are excluded from the report.

Hospital Authorities were asked to return their output in terms of work done in the year of return, valuing that work on the basis of the cost of materials used and wages and salaries paid, together with the establishment charges attributable to the work carried out. Similarly, the cost of materials related to materials used, not materials purchased in the year.
