GENERAL INFORMATION
Changes in the 1963 census
There were few changes resulting from amendments to the Standard Industrial Classification a
only minor changes in the scope of certain industry reports compared with 1958 . Any such
changes are explained in the introduct ions changes are explained in the introductions to
the industry reports concerned or by footnotes
to the tables. to the tables.
Industrial Classification
Establishments were classified to industries on
the basis of major activity in conformity with the basis of major activity in conformity with
the second edition of the Standard Industrial Classification (Consolidated Edition 1963, incorporat ing Amendment 1). Each industry was
basically defined in terms of its principal basically defined in terms of its principal
products, these being of a similar nature or products, these being of a similar nature or
commonly associated in product ion. Normally,
an establishment an establissment was classified to an industry
if its sales of the principal products of trat if its sales of the principal products of that
industry accounted for a greater proportion of its total sales than did its sales of the principal products of any other industry. How
ever, where the application of this rule would have resulted in a change of classification betwen 1958 and 1963, the establishment was
reclassified only if the sales of principal rectassified only if the sales of principal
products of the newly predominant industry was more than one third greater than the sales of
principal products of the previously predominan principal products of the previously predominan
industry. This modification of the general industry. This modification of the general
rule was introduced for 1958 to avoid disrule was introduced for 1958 to avoid dis-
continuit ies which would result from marginal
changes in sales between successive censuses. changes in sales between successive censuses
The principle of classification by major output was also normally followed in compiling
the analysis by sub-divisions of an industry. the analysis by sub-divisions of an industry
In certain industries, classification was dealt with in a different way. Details of any non-standard treatment are given in the intro
ductions to the relevant industry reports.

Capital Expenditure

This represents the cost incurred dur ing the year of new building and other new

on the extension or reconstruction of old on the extension or reconstruct ion of old nature carried out by firms' own staff, an the cost of any newly constructed build ings purchased. The figures shown include any

This Report on the Furniture and Upholstery Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing wooden or upholstered domestic, of fice school, church, theatre and cinema furniture; wooden radio and television cabinets; billiard tables; upholstered seats for vehicles and aircr
furniture, etc. Metal furniture and rustic furniture are excluded.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 472 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Consolidated edition, 1963).
In this industry, where small firms account for a relatively large proportion of employment and output, a sample of firms employing fewer than twenty-five persons was asked to complete a simplified version of the full census form for 1963; Tables $2(\mathrm{ii})$ and $5(\mathrm{i})$.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (ii), (iii) and (iv).
