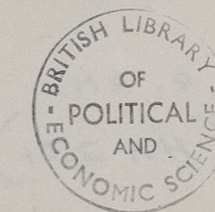

Introduction

The United Kingdom economy is made up of a wide range of economic activities through which goods are produced or services rendered by firms and other organisations. For analytical purposes, economic activities of a similar nature may be grouped together into 'industries', for example into agriculture, motor vehicle manufacture, retail distribution, catering, national government service. A system used to group activities in this way is described as an industrial classification. 'Industry' in this context is not restricted to extractive or production activities but extends to the provision of goods and services of all kinds.

2 Such a classification usually starts with a small number of broad groups of activities which are then subdivided into progressively narrower groups so that the classification can be used with varying amounts of detail for different purposes. Thus a broad group 'Transport and communication' may be subdivided first into the different modes of transport (road, rail, water, air) and communication (postal services, telecommunications) and these in turn into smaller subdivisions such as road haulage, bus and coach services, etc.

3 The first comprehensive Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) for the United Kingdom was issued in 1948. It provided a framework for the collection, presentation and analysis of data about the performance of the economy. It also promoted uniformity and comparability between statistics prepared in different government departments. The classification was revised in 1958 and again in 1968 to take account of changes in the organisation and relative importance of a number of industries, and to distinguish new industries not separately identified previously.

4 From the outset, the SIC of the United Kingdom followed the same broad principles as the relevant international standards. UK statisticians played an important part in the formulation of the United Nations International Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities (ISIC) issued in 1948 and revised in 1958 and 1968. Nevertheless, there were differences in detail between the two since ISIC reflected the structure of economic activity in the world as a whole rather than that in one particular country.

5 One of the principal objectives of the current revision of the SIC has been to examine and eliminate differences from the Statistical Office of the European Communities' (SOEC) activity classification, 'Nomenclature Générale des Activités Économiques dans les Communautés Européennes', usually abbreviated to 'NACE'. NACE can be rearranged to agree with ISIC at aggregated levels but departs from it at detailed levels. The present revision of the SIC applies NACE as closely as is practicable to the structure of British industry. Use of the revised classification will thus enable data collected in the United Kingdom to be used more easily for the purpose of making comparisons with other EEC countries as well as for analysis of the British economy.

6 A summary of the main changes between the 1968

classification and the present revision, and of the relationship to ISIC and to NACE will be available from the Central Statistical Office in 1980.

7 - As with previous revisions the present revision of the classification has been prepared by an inter-departmental committee representing the main government departments collecting and using the statistics. Consultations have also taken place with a number of trade associations and other organisations, whose assistance is gratefully acknowledged.

The basis and structure of the classification

8 The classification is intended to apply to units about which important economic statistics are collected. (A description of the units used in certain major surveys is given in paragraph 23.) A number of different factors have been taken into account in the classification. They include the nature of the process or of the work done, the principal raw material used, the type or intended use of goods produced or handled, and the type of service rendered. Different factors predominate in different parts of the classification and in many cases a broad group based on one common factor is subdivided by reference to another. The different headings of the classification (i.e. the short titles of the industries) are accordingly worded so as to indicate the factor or combination of factors on which they are based and this is followed in each case by a brief description of the activities included.

9 Unlike the 1968 SIC which had 27 Orders, each divided into a number of 'Minimum List Headings' denoted by 3-digit numbers, the present classification has a decimal structure. The full range of activities is first divided into ten broad Divisions (listed in paragraph 12 below) each denoted by a single digit from 0 to 9. The Divisions are in turn subdivided into Classes (each denoted by the addition of a second digit), the Classes into Groups (3 digits) and the Groups into Activity headings (4 digits). There are 10 Divisions, 60 Classes, 222 Groups and 334 Activity headings. The full number of possible subdivisions at each level is not necessarily used but is varied according to the diversity of activities included. For example, Division 0 Agriculture, forestry and fishing is divided into only three Classes, without further subdivisions, whereas Division 4 Other manufacturing industries has 8 Classes, 50 Groups and 91 Activity headings. The use of 0 as the final digit for a Class, Group or Activity heading normally indicates that it is the only subdivision at that level. Thus Group 140 is the only Group in Class 14 (Mineral oil processing) but is itself divided into two Activity headings, 1401 and 1402. Class 16, (Production and distribution of electricity, gas and other forms of energy) on the other hand has three Groups which are therefore numbered 161, 162 and 163 but since none of these is further subdivided the Activity headings are numbered 1610, 1620 and 1630. The numbering system follows that of NACE as far as

practicable since this will facilitate both the transmission of data and comparisons of UK data with those of other member countries. In cases where the SIC departs from NACE the Groups or Activity headings concerned have generally been allotted numbers which are not used in NACE in order to avoid confusion. This has resulted in some gaps in the sequence of numbers. (One exception to this, however, is Group 453 in the UK classification - the clothing industry. The SIC Group combines Groups 453 and 454 of NACE and the nine Activity headings within the group are given numbers which are used in different NACE subdivisions of the clothing industry.

10 The Activity headings of the present classification will be used in broadly the same way as the Minimum List Headings of the 1968 classification. This is the level which will normally be used for classifying units providing the range of data such as employment, expenses, turnover, capital formation, etc. usually collected in economic censuses and similar enquiries. There will be an increase in the amount of industry detail available since there are 334 Activity headings compared with the 181 Minimum List Headings. But a number of the new Activity headings replace 'operational subdivisions' of the previous classification for which data were in fact published in Census of Production reports.

11 Activity headings are frequently divided into numbered sub-divisions both in the general description of their content and in the lists of principal products or activities. These descriptive sub-divisions are intended primarily for ease of exposition. Their use for statistical purposes will be limited.

12 In addition to the change in the numbering system there are major changes also in the sequence in which different industries are listed. These arise mainly because the various extractive industries are now each followed by the corresponding processing industries. The table opposite gives a broad comparison between the Divisions of the present classification and the former Orders, although the correspondence is not exact since relatively minor differences in coverage are ignored.

13 A further point of difference between the present and former classifications arises because the present classification draws a distinction, where possible, between principals and agents. Thus, in the case of the distributive trades, dealers buying or selling on behalf of others, whether in this country or abroad, are classified separately from the wholesalers who actually take ownership of the goods in which they deal. Similarly, in the financial field, a distinction is made between the insurance companies, which actually carry the risks, and insurance brokers or agents and between financial institutions, such as banks, building societies or investment companies, and such services as stock-broking or dealing in foreign exchange. These distinctions should prove valuable in providing more homogeneous data for the headings concerned, particularly for capital formation and for financial statistics.

Related classifications

14 There are several other classifications both national and international, which may be used in conjunction with the industrial classification. These include, for example, the classification of occupations, which relates to the jobs performed by individual workers rather than to the industry in which they work. The workers classified to a particular industry will fall into a number of different categories of an occupational classification and similarly the workers in some occupations may be found in many different industries.

15 A second classification, used mainly in the national accounts, is that by institutional sector. This groups units according to their organisation or ownership, i.e. it distinguishes between unincorporated businesses, companies, public corporations (nationalised industries), central or local government. The industrial classification does not make such distinctions but brings together units engaged in similar activities, irrespective of ownership.

16 A third classification is that of products - often a listing of individual products or groups of similar products according to the industries in which they are principally produced. The number of entries depends on how far it is desired to go in the separate identification of products usually produced in the same industry and for similar purposes but varying in the materials used, quality, size, shape, etc. The amount of detail needed for statistical purposes is much less than would be required for, say, a manufacturer's catalogue. The classification can also be extended to cover not only the production of goods but distribution, transport and other service industries though the number of different types of service included will normally be much less than the number of different products of production industries.

17 The alphabetical list of industries and their typical products included in *Indexes to the Standard Industrial Classification Revised 1980* is an example. Strictly, statistics produced on this basis do not measure the full production of an item. Each product or service is in general classified only to one industry – that in which it is mainly produced. In practice many units produce not only the goods or services which are principal products of the industries to which the units are classified but also products mainly produced in other industries. As a result, the total production of the units classified to a particular industry will not necessarily represent the total production of all the items listed as principal products of that industry.

18 At the international level, the United Nations has published lists of principal products under each ISIC industry and an 'International classification of goods and services' (ICGS) in which the products of each industry group are further classified into sub-groups. NACE is supported by the 'Nomenclature commune des produits industriels' (NIPRO) which provides detailed lists of products under each industry but covers only that section of NACE dealing with manufacturing industry.

19 The product lists associated with industrial activity classifications contrast with the classifications for recording imports and exports. The 'United Nations Standard International Trade Classification' (SITC) and the 'Customs Co-operation Council's Nomenclature' (CCCN) with which it is correlated have been widely adopted throughout the world as the basis for national classifications both for tariff and trade statistics purposes. They are used in this way in the United Kingdom and in the rest of the EEC. But in each case the SITC headings have been further sub-divided to provide more detail, mainly related to differences in quality, size, etc.

Statistical units

20 The classification is applied to units on the basis of their principal activity. Frequently no problem arises in defining the relevant unit. This will be the case, for example, where the unit is situated at a single address, is mainly engaged in a single activity (or group of activities falling within the same heading of the classification) and is operated as a separate entity for the purposes of record-keeping and accounting (including VAT returns).

21 In many cases, however, the situation is more complex. Many units produce, sell or provide a variety of goods or services, some of which are considered to be appropriate to one heading of the classification and some to another. In such cases the unit as a whole is classified according to the type of goods or services which make up the greater part of its production, sales or service. In governmental inquiries a unit's classification is made on the basis of information relating to the unit which is supplied on the particular return or which is already available from other inquiries. In some cases classification may be based on the units' own description of its principal activity.

22 The units to be classified may vary according to the type of data being collected and the purposes for which the data are required. In view of this it is important that when analyses by industry are prepared the statistical unit used for the inquiry concerned should be defined. Sometimes, in order to secure compatibility between the results of different inquiries, it may be necessary to give some units more than one classification. This may occur, for example, when a unit at one address can provide a limited range of data, say, employment but for the provision of more comprehensive data has to be combined with another unit, or units, under the same ownership which are mainly engaged in a different activity.

23 The units used in some of the main regular statistical inquiries are as follows:

(a) *Production inquiries* Information is collected on a wide range of subjects, e.g. production or sales of goods, number of employees, wages and salaries paid, purchases of goods and services from other industries, stocks and fixed capital formation. As far as possible the unit in respect of which such information is collected is one whose activities fall within a single activity heading of the classification and which is situated at a single geographical location. Frequently, however, the information required cannot be provided on this basis but relates to two or more locations and a mixture of activities. The statistical unit, usually termed 'the establishment', is therefore defined as the smallest unit for which the information normally required in these inquiries can be provided.

(b) *Inquiries into the distributive and service trades* Many of the units in these trades consist of independent shops or other premises for which no problems arise. But an increasing proportion of total turnover, particularly in retail distribution, is accounted for by companies and other organisations with numerous branches and with centralised purchasing and stockholding arrangements. In these cases the unit for which much of the data required can be obtained is necessarily the organisation as a whole, although some data, such as sales or numbers employed, may be available for the separate branches. The VAT unit is playing an increasing role in the collection of data in respect of these industries.

(c) *Census of employment* Within each organisation each address at which there are employees is generally regarded as the unit for classification purposes. Normally the whole unit is classified according to the major activity carried out at the address; if however, there are two or more quite distinct activities for which separate information can be provided then each is classified separately. The units are, if necessary, given more than one classification, that is according to the major activity of the unit itself and also the major activities of larger entities of which the census unit is a part, and which constitutes the statistical unit for other inquiries.

24 Many businesses produce for their own use goods or services which are normally produced for sale by other industries. Typical examples are the manufacture or printing of containers for their own products, the

generation of electricity, research, the repair and maintenance of buildings and equipment, and, occasionally, the construction or extension of buildings. If the relevant range of information is available these ancillary activities are treated as separate units and classified according to their own activity. But frequently the necessary data is not available, and the ancillary activities cannot be distinguished for most statistical purposes. Where ancillary activities are carried out at separate locations it may be possible to treat them as units for a limited range of data e.g. for the census of employment.

25 The sales staff of a manufacturing business are not treated as a separate establishment unless separate wholesale or retail outlets are operated and complete accounts are kept for them.

26 The classification of head offices or other central offices at separate locations from those at which the main activities of the business are carried out is determined by the nature of the activities of the units which they serve. If those units are all classified to the same industry there is no problem; but if they are classified to two or more different industries, the classification of the head office, etc. is that of the largest part of the activities. Exceptionally, if the activities are very diffuse, the central office is classified in heading 8396 – Central offices not allocable elsewhere – which is also used for the UK offices of businesses operating mainly abroad.

27 Although the classification is designed primarily for use in connection with units such as those discussed in paragraph 23 above it can also be used for other units. For example, it is used by the Inland Revenue for industrial analysis of income tax (schedule D) and corporation tax assessments. In these cases the unit is that which is liable to the tax in question, in many cases a number of establishments engaged in different activities. The data aggregated under a particular activity heading will inevitably relate to a more heterogeneous group of activities than data based on establishments or similar units. Another example is the use of the classification in statistics of financial flows. Here the unit is normally the company or group of companies under the same ownership. These units are even more heterogeneous than those used for tax statistics. As the units increase in size and diversity of activities, classification to a single industry heading at the most detailed level becomes misleading. An abridged version of the classification may therefore be employed in such cases, using broader groupings based on the Groups, Classes or even combinations of Classes of the classification.

28 At the other end of the scale the classification is used in data relating to unemployment, sickness, industrial injuries, etc. where the units are individuals who are classified according to the industry in which they are, or were last, employed.

29 The classification may be used from time to time as a convenient way of defining the scope of legislation relating to particular taxes, subsidies, capital grants,

health and safety regulations, etc.

Some special points

30 *Steel* An exception to the rule of classification according to major activity is that reporting units whose activities include the basic manufacture of iron and steel, as defined in the ECSC Treaty, are classified to heading 2210 – Iron and steel industry.

31 *Merchanting activities* Establishments mainly engaged in merchanting, broking, importing and exporting are classified to the appropriate heading in the distributive trades, not to the industry or trade producing the goods in which they deal.

32 *Repair work* Much repair work is carried out either by the manufacturers or by the distributors of the goods concerned, or of similar goods, and in such cases it is rarely possible to distinguish a separate unit engaged mainly in repair work. There are, however, numerous units which specialise in repair work, mainly of consumer goods – motor vehicles, footwear, watches and clocks, television and radio sets, etc. These specialist repair activities are classified separately. The repair of capital equipment, such as ships, aircraft, and most types of plant and machinery is classified with the corresponding manufacture, even if carried out by specialist units. Units engaged in the repair and maintenance of buildings are classified to Construction.

33 *Construction* In principle all construction work should be classified to Class 50 – Construction. In practice it is impossible to obtain a full range of economic statistics for construction work done by all directly employed labour. These activities will generally be classified to the same heading as the establishment which they serve. The construction activities of direct labour forces employed by local authorities and government departments, using direct labour are, however, allocated to Class 50.

34 *Installation work* The installation of machinery, equipment, etc. is normally carried out by the manufacturer or distributor and is not distinguishable as a separate activity. There are some business units, however, where installation is the only, or the major activity. Such units are classified according to the type of equipment involved as follows:

(i) The installation of items which can be regarded as forming an integral part of a building, e.g. an electrical wiring system, heating and ventilating apparatus, is classified to Construction.

(ii) The installation of equipment which requires little more than the connection of the equipment to the mains, e.g. of domestic washing machines, television sets, is classified to Distribution.

(iii) The installation of plant and machinery, e.g. a computer, is with two exceptions, classified with the manufacture of similar articles. The first exception is that establishments specialising in the installation of complete process plant e.g. chemical plant, petrochemical and gas plant, oil refining plant and iron and

steel works plant are classified to heading 3243 - Process engineering contractors. The second is that specialist installers of electrical equipment or machinery, who are not also manufacturers, are classified to heading 3480 - Electrical equipment installation. Ordinary wiring installation is classified to Construction.
