18 Starch and miscellaneous foods

This Report on the Starch and Miscellaneous Foods Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing starch, starch products, self-raising flour, ice and all foods such as cornflour, glucose, blancmange and custard powders, cake mixtures, macaroni, spaghetti, etc, yeast, coffee extracts and essences, vegetarian foods, and mustard. Blending flour, grinding pepper and spices, shelling and grinding nuts, tea blending, coffee roasting and blending, etc are included; the canning of rice puddings, etc is included but the canning of spaghetti, etc is excluded.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 229(2) in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 Census.

The industry corresponds to the Starch and Miscellaneous Foods Industry (Part 17) in the Reports on the last detailed Census of Production for 1963 except that establishments engaged wholly or mainly in tea blending, coffee roasting and blending were not in scope of the census for 1963.

Throughout this Report, the figures given for 1963 have been reclassified as far as possible, according to the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) so that data for 1963 and 1968 are on the same industrial basis. However it has not been possible to include in the 1963 data information relating to activities which were then out of scope of the Census. To this extent the figures for 1963 will not be comparable with those for 1968.

METHOD OF CLASSIFICATION

The standard classification procedure has been adapted to bring within scope of the Grain Milling Industry (Part 7) milling establishments with substantial sales of self-raising flour (made from flour of establishments' own milling) which would otherwise have been classified to this industry. For this purpose sales of self-raising flour (made from flour of establishments' own milling) were treated equally as principal products of both the Grain Milling Industry and the Starch and Miscellaneous Foods Industry, unless they amounted to 85 per cent. or more of the total output in which case the return was classified to this industry. The total sales of self-raising flour by all industries are shown in Table 5 of this report.

The classification of returns to sub-divisions of this industry followed the standard procedure.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv).
