## RUBBER

THIS REPORT on the Rubber Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of solid and pneumatic tyres of all types and inner tubes, sheet rubber, sponge rubber rubber tubing and hose, balata belting, rubber footwear, gloves, bathing caps, toys, balls, flooring and tiling, etc., including those made from synthetic rubber. Establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of synthetic rubber for sale as such are excluded and covered in the report on the Chemicals (General) Industry (Volume 2, Industry E). Establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of rubber or synthetic rubber clothing, are also excluded and covered in the report on the Tailoring, Dressmaking, etc.. Industry (Volume 7. Industry H).

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 190 in the Standard Industrial Classification
