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## CANVAS GOODS AND SACKS TRADE

THIS REPORT on the Canvas Goods and Sacks Trade relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in making-up canvas goods and in the manufacture and repair of sacks and bags. The 1948 particulars cover establishments maintained by railway undertakings engaged in making-up or repairing tarpaulins, wagon covers, etc.; railway companies were not covered in 1937 and did not make separate establishment returns in 1935. It is deficient on this account by about ten per cent. of the total for the trade.

The 1937 particulars also exclude establishments engaged olely in the repair and reconditioning of purchased sacks, these establishments being outside the scope of the 1937 Inquiry. For this reason. Table I includes separate 1935 figures for those sections of the trade covered by the 1937
Inquiry. Inquiry.

This trade corresponds to minimum list heading 122(1) in the Standard Industrial Classification.

Particulars available in respect of H. M. prisons are given separately in a footnote to Table I. For 1937 and 1935 similar information was not collected.

Establishments in this trade in Northern Ireland (which are excluded in 1948) accounted in 1935 for about 2 per cent of the net output for the United Kingdom.
