Report of the Acting Superintendent-General of Education for the Year ending 30th September, 1917.

Department of Public Education,
Cape Town, June, 1918.

TO THE HONOURABLE THE ADMINISTRATOR.

SIR,—I have the honour to submit to you the following report on the work of the Education Department for the year ending 30th September, 1917.

The plan and arrangement of the report are essentially the same as in former years. The report is intended to be a record of the progress of education during the year.

Most of the points herein dealt with, and the figures herein tabulated, have already appeared in *The Education Gazette*, which is issued fortnightly, or in the quarterly issue which is devoted to statistics with reference to enrolment, attendance and other kindred matters.

I. ADMINISTRATION.

HEAD OFFICE.—During the year the following changes in the staff occurred. The late Mr. J. R. Cuthbert, Railway Education Officer, took up duties as an Inspector of Schools. Mr. Thomas Hedley, B.A., LL.B., head of the School Board Branch, passed away in November, 1916, after a short illness. In him the Department lost a most able and efficient officer. His post was filled by the appointment of Mr. A. W. Pomeroy. Mr. C. M. Tregarthen must now be added to the list of those from the Education Office who have died on active service. He was a young officer of promise, who carried out his responsible duties as head of the Authorising Branch with constant care and attention. A considerable amount of extra work has resulted from the continued depletion of the staff, from the fact that the salaries and grading of teachers had to be overhauled as the result of the passing of the Teachers' Salaries Ordinance, and from the increased volume of work caused by the growth in schools and enrolment. Certain members of the staff have felt the strain more than others, but one and all have cheerfully undertaken the duties required of them.

INSPECTORATE.—Several of the Transkeian Circuits were recast and a new Circuit carved out as the result. This post was filled by the appointment of Mr. R. J. Baigrie, M.A., headmaster of the First Class Public School at Fort Beaufort. Mr. C. S. Young, Departmental Instructor in Manual Training, retired after twenty years' service. When he was appointed little or no instruction had been given in woodwork and the related drawing. At the date of his retirement there were under his control in the western half of the Province 115 schools where woodwork was taught to 6,231 pupils. It is hoped that he may long enjoy his well-merited leisure.

LANGUAGE ORDINANCE.—Further progress was made in the work of bringing the provisions of this ordinance more fully into operation. Amongst subsidiary means for attaining this end it may be stated that a vacation course in Dutch was held at Cape Town in December, 1916, in which the subjects of the elementary school course, viz., reading, arithmetic, language lessons, and geography, as required in the lower standards, were dealt with, and that Dutch classes for teachers in the Cape Peninsula were held in Cape Town from July, 1916, onwards. Inspector Watermeyer reported that there were 167 students on the roll of the weekday classes and 103 on the roll of the Saturday classes. The progress made was reported to be highly satisfactory. Mention must also be made of a memorandum issued by His Honour the Administrator to indicate the scope and purpose of the Ordinance. The concluding paragraph of that Memorandum is quoted here in full:—"The Language Ordinance in practice, therefore, gives mother-tongue instruction up to and including Standard IV., and equality of opportunity thereafter. It also provides for parallel classes in certain cases, for bilingual instruction through bilingual teachers in the vast majority of primary, and a percentage of secondary schools, and it does not separate the races into different camps but breaks down entirely the theory of separate schools for English and Dutch-speaking children respectively."

REMISSION OF SCHOOL FEES.—Regulations for the extension of the provisions of Section 10 of the School Board Further Amendment Act, No. 25 of 1909, were approved by the Provincial Council and came into force during the year under review. It is not necessary here to quote these regulations fully, but they provided that school fees might be remitted in whole or in part—

- (a) for pupils who were attending a school under a school board and taking part in the ordinary instruction up to and including the standard or age limit in force in the district under the control of the Board, where the Board and the Superintendent-General of Education were satisfied as to the indigent circumstances of the parents or guardians;
- (b) for pupils who had passed the compulsory standard or age limit, on the ground of indigent circumstances, provided (1) that there is sufficient accommodation and teaching staff to warrant free instruction, (2) that the pupil has not passed Standard VII, (3) and that he has not completed his sixteenth year; and
- (c) in regard to pupils of a higher age or standard exemptions at the discretion of the Superintendent-General of Education on the application of the Board, but only where the Inspector of Schools shall have certified in writing that the pupil concerned shows marked ability or promise in his studies.

LEGISLATION.—The Ordinances which were passed by the Provincial Council during the Session of 1917 were:—

- (1) Education (Teachers in State-aided Schools Dismissal) Ordinance, No. 14.
- (2) Education (Payment of School Fees) Ordinance, No. 15.
- (3) Education (Teachers' Salaries and Pension) Ordinance, No. 23.
- (4) School Board Act (Further) Amendment Ordinance, No. 7.
- (5) Indigent Children (Boarding House) Ordinance, No. 11.
- (6) School Board Deficiencies Ordinance, No. 16.
- (7) Medical Inspection of Schools Ordinance, No. 20.

It is not possible within the compass of this report to deal exhaustively with each Ordinance, but some explanation is necessary.

(1) This Ordinance extended to all schools aided by the State the principle that no teacher may be dismissed without the approval of the Department having been obtained.

(2) The main feature of this Ordinance is that it legalised the payment of school fees for the children of men on active service, not only as heretofore for pupils in School Board schools, but for pupils attending any school not conducted for private profit.

(3) By far the most important piece of legislation in the educational world since the passing of the School Board Act is that known as the Teachers' Salaries and Pension Ordinance. Many anomalies existed in salaries as between teacher and teacher and board and board. Great dissatisfaction prevailed, and it was acknowledged generally that there were good grounds for discontent. Certain classes of teachers, among them female teachers of the rank and file, were very badly paid. One great grievance was that there was no system of increments. It was generally felt that the whole system needed revision. The Honourable the Administrator caused an examination to be conducted by a Commission into the question of emoluments, and each suggestion by teachers and by educational bodies to be carefully weighed before the drafting of the Ordinance which has received the assent of the Provincial Council. It may be affirmed that it has received the approbation of teachers as a class, and that it ought to make the teaching profession more attractive than it has ever been.

(4) By this Ordinance the leaving age of pupils was raised to 15 years, and the standard of compulsion to Standard V.

(5) The Indigent Children Boarding House Ordinance is a most important Ordinance, which should go a considerable way towards solving the question of bringing to school children whom the educational system hitherto has not reached. It provides for the establishment and maintenance of indigent boarding-houses at approved centres for European children aged 7 to 15 years, who were entirely without opportunity of receiving schooling. The beneficial effects of this piece of legislation have already become apparent.

(6) This Ordinance gave certain Divisional Councils the power to levy rates in excess of the maximum previously laid down in order to meet School Board deficits which were outstanding.

(7) The Administrator was given power to provide for compulsory medical inspection of pupils and teachers at any school under a School Board, and for the exclusion on medical grounds of pupils or teachers from any such school.

II. SUPPLY OF SCHOOLS.

At the end of September, 1917, there were 4,845 schools under the control of the Department, being an increase for the year of 78. White schools increased by 45, and Native and Coloured schools by 33. Practically the whole increase occurred in Third Class Public Schools, in Mission Schools, and in Schools for Aborigines.

Before tabulating the results it would be well to state the principles which should govern the supply of schools. The object of the Boards should be to augment the attendance at schools under their control wherever possible, and so make it possible to increase the number of teachers at these schools. In this way, by providing that each teacher would have fewer classes to teach, greater efficiency would be obtained. Boards should take stock and, where possible, remove superfluous schools, while all new applications should be carefully scrutinised and arrangements made, if possible, for the enrolment of new pupils at existing schools.

EUROPEAN SCHOOLS.—In the subjoined table are given, arranged according to grade, the numbers of State-aided schools for European children at 30th September, 1917. For purposes of comparison, the corresponding details for 1916 are included:—

A new Industrial School for Boys was opened at Kakamas, and one for Girls at Riebeeck West. The First Class Boys' School at Riversdale became a High School; Vryburg Second Class School was promoted to be a First Class School; Touws River Railway Third Class School and Joubertina Third Class School were raised to the rank of Second Class Public Schools.

NON-EUROPEAN SCHOOLS.—In the subjoined tables are given, arranged according to grade, the numbers of State-aided Schools for native and coloured children at 30th September, 1917. For purposes of comparison the corresponding details for 1916 are included.

III. ENROLMENT AND ATTENDANCE.

EUROPEAN CHILDREN.—The total number of pupils enrolled at the end of September, 1917, was 116,491. This was an increase for the twelve months under consideration of 5,424. Thus for the second year in succession the increase exceeded the normal natural increase by 2,000. This bears eloquent testimony to the success of the efforts now being put forward to bring children to school.

NON-EUROPEAN CHILDREN.—The enrolment at the end of September, 1917, stood at 138,397, being a decrease for the year of 4,598. The increased cost of living has operated hardly on the non-European population, and probably this has caused a shortage of money available for school fees, and a consequent decreased enrolment.

EUROPEAN AND NON-EUROPEAN CHILDREN.—The total number of pupils enrolled in the Government-aided schools of the Cape Province was thus 254,888, an advance of 826 pupils over 1916. Unfortunately, the average attendance, which had fallen in 1916 to 86.5 per cent., has declined still further to 86.4 per cent. It is almost needless to add that a class cannot attain to a high level of excellence unless a satisfactory attendance is maintained.

The question of attendance seems to be intimately connected with the degree of enthusiasm which the teacher brings to bear on his work. It has been reported frequently that where the teacher is zealous and keen he expects zeal and keenness and regularity of attendance from his pupils, and gets them.

The question of rewards in the shape of prizes for markedly good attendance is one that should have the attention of School Boards and the Principals of Schools. This method has been tried in various places and has conduced invariably to more regular attendance.

Teachers should make an unceasing fight against irregularity. They should keep the Board fully informed of cases of defaulters. The Board on its side should then communicate with the parents concerned, and in the end if remonstrances and friendly advice fail should take sterner action.

IV. INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

The inspection circuits were increased by one, a re-arrangement and reduction of the Transkeian areas having become necessary. When the vacant circuit is filled there will be 39 circuit inspectors. In addition there are the High Schools Inspector, the Inspector of Training Colleges, and two relieving Inspectors. One of these latter, the late Mr. J. R. Cuthbert, was for six months of the period under review laid aside by illness, which subsequently ended in his death. He was in the service of the Department as teacher, Railway Education Officer, and Inspector of Schools for 38 years. He was an able organiser, a genial and kindly adviser to hosts of teachers, and a loyal servant of the Department. His loss is keenly felt, and not least by the body of Railway School teachers. His place as Relieving Inspector was filled for a time by Mr. C. F. W. Rosenow, and later by Mr. P. J. le Roux, both of whom had had long service as teachers.

4,773 inspections were conducted as compared with 4,649 in 1916. The result of this increased number of inspections was a correspondingly decreased number of informal visits, which now amounted to 2,399 as against 2,531 in 1916.

Several of the Inspectors had an excessive number of schools under their control. The highest number in the Province proper was 149, and in the Native Territories, 155. The average, 124 schools to each Inspector, is much higher than it should be. The need for a strengthening of the Staff of Inspectors is constantly felt.

The Departmental Instructors and Instructresses to the number of thirteen were engaged in organising and supervising the instruction given in Drawing, Singing, Woodwork, Needlework, Kindergarten Method, Cookery and Nature Study. 1,916 visits were made, compared with 2,547 in the preceding year. In accordance with the policy of the Department, more time has been spent by the Instructors in Training Colleges and Schools where pupil teachers are undergoing instruction, with the result that fewer schools have been visited.

V., VI. ATTAINMENTS AND PROGRESS OF PUPILS.

In accordance with Ordinance 23 of 1917 Schools under School Boards have been re-classified as Secondary, Intermediate, Primary and Private Farm Schools, and the names First-Class, Second-Class, Third-Class and Poor Schools have been discarded. The new names are rational and to a large extent self-explanatory, but at the same time it is well that some detailed explanation should be given. Before stating the functions of each school as regards instruction given, it is necessary to say that other elements such as staffing, equipment, and average number of pupils over a period have to be considered before a school is placed in any particular grade.

A Secondary School is one that provides instruction up to Standard E of the High School Course of the Department. In other words, it affords a course of instruction up to the Matriculation standard. Certain of the Secondary Schools are graded by the Department as High Schools.

Intermediate Schools are those which provide instruction up to and including Standard VII. in the subjects of the Elementary School Course and in two approved special subjects suited to the locality.

Primary Schools are those which maintain an average minimum attendance of ten pupils, and which give instruction according to the Elementary School Course. The highest standard in such schools is determined by the qualifications of the staff, and the interests of the majority of the pupils.

Private Farm Schools are those which have a minimum average attendance of five pupils. In other respects these schools correspond to Primary Schools.

So far the Curriculum used in the schools has not been altered. A conference, however, was called together in July, 1917, for the purpose of discussing what alterations may be desirable in the present school curriculum, the present method of school inspection and the present system of school examinations. The members of the conference comprised two representatives of the institutions for training teachers, four representatives of the teachers' associations, and four inspectors of schools, while the Acting Superintendent-General of Education presided. The deliberations were not completed, but from the trend of the discussions it emerged that greater elasticity in respect of the curriculum and the inspection of schools was desirable. It may be stated the findings of this Conference have at a recent date been made available for definite action.

The following tables show the number of pupils in each of the standards of the school after inspection. The figures for 1916 are in each case given for purposes of comparison.

The greater proportion of the pupils in High School Standard E enter for the Matriculation Examination of the Cape University. At the examination held in December, 1917, 1,038 candidates were successful in passing. From the table subjoined it will be seen that 639 passes came to the Cape Province. Further and illustrative of the quality of the work done in our High Schools it appears that of 152 first-class passes 105 were secured by the Cape Province. 24 candidates gained places in Class I. (Bursary Division), of whom 17 hailed from Cape Province schools.

NON-EUROPEAN CHILDREN: PRIMARY EDUCATION.—From the table which follows, it will be seen that very few native children go beyond Standard IV. There must be causes for this lack of sufficient progress. Greater State aid, and a curriculum more suited to native needs, are sometimes put forward as the remedies required; but Inspector Houghton is of opinion that there are other obstacles of progress. He says: "The heathenism of the great majority of natives, their desire to be let alone in their old way of living, their indifference to the advantages of school training, their laziness where no immediate end is to be served, their low moral standards in matters of truth and purity—these, reflected in the work of the teacher and in the attitude of parents and pupils, are the real obstacles to progress."

NON-EUROPEAN CHILDREN: SECONDARY EDUCATION.—This is confined, with the exception of Pupil Teacher Classes, to the First-Class Public School at Lovedale, where there were 43 non-European children in attendance at the end of September, 1917, as against 52 the previous year, and 66 in 1915. Of these 43 pupils, only 6 were in classes above Standard VII. This cannot be considered a satisfactory state of affairs.

VII. SPECIAL SUBJECTS OF INSTRUCTION.

DRAWING.—Steady progress continues to be made in the teaching of this subject, and teachers are applying more common sense to their work. It has been very up-hill work in many cases to get some of the older teachers to appreciate the spirit of the drawing syllabus, but prejudice and opposition have been gradually overcome, and the day is approaching when the subject will rank among the best taught in the curriculum. The statistics for 1916 and 1917 are given side by side for purposes of comparison:—

SINGING.—This subject is, on the whole, in a satisfactory state. South African children are not without musical ability, and respond readily to the efforts of their teachers, who, year by year, are showing more ability in conducting and training school choirs:—

NEEDLEWORK.—This subject might be bracketed with singing as one that is on a sound basis, and in which the methods of instruction are satisfactory. A regrettable feature of our educational system is that in small country schools, where the sole teacher is a male, the girls usually have perforce to go without instruction in the use of the needle. WOODWORK.—As a result of the war and the consequent difficulties of transport, timber and implements have been dear and hard to obtain. The position of the subject, in comparison with the year 1916, is shown in the following table:—

COOKERY.—This subject is now taught in all the High Schools with the exception of two. Greater progress would undoubtedly have been made but for the fact that the supply of trained and competent teachers of this subject is very limited, and by no means equal to the demand. Steps will require to be taken to ensure that more teachers of cookery become available. The statistics are:—

NATURE STUDY.—Progress continues to be made in this subject. School gardens have been established at a fair number of schools, and trees and flowers have been cultivated, often in spite of adverse circumstances, such as barren, stony ground and lack of water. Even in small, remote schools pupils are beginning to make collections of stones, fossils, wild flowers, etc., and to record their observations of nature in calendars and notebooks. It is easily apparent that an awakening to the importance and value of Nature Study is taking place.

PHYSICAL TRAINING.—Drill rather than Physical Training is taught. It is almost too much to expect any teacher short of an expert to give the necessary remedial exercises in order to correct faults of deportment, straighten bent backs, and otherwise improve the physique of the pupils. Such remedial work is done in many of the best schools. The statistics are:—

VIII. TEACHERS.

As was mentioned last year, greater time is now spent by the Departmental Instructors in schools and colleges where teachers are trained than heretofore. This policy, which is a sound one, has resulted in fewer visits being paid to schools. On the other hand, every future teacher has come under the direct personal instruction of the Departmental Instructors, and this should bear good fruit when these young teachers go forth to take up posts.

It will be of interest here to record the opinion of the late Mr. Fouché, who reported on the position of Dutch in the Training Institutions. "At the majority of the Institutions," he says, "an extensive scheme of work was submitted, and there was evidence that the study of Dutch was taken seriously. Everywhere it is being urged that the intensive and private reading in Dutch should be on the same footing as the work done in English. Great difficulty is experienced in obtaining suitable Dutch books, and the books are expensive."

QUALIFICATIONS OF TEACHERS.—The number of teachers in the employment of the Department at 30th June, was 10,215, being an increase for the year of 472. Of these 6,739 were the holders of a professional certificate. This number represents a percentage of 66. Of the 3,476 remaining, many were partially qualified—that is, they had passed the examination for the First Year or Second Year Pupil Teachers' Certificate, but had not completed the course. The number of uncertificated teachers still continues to be unduly high.

In the schools of the Province, excluding the Native Territories, the number of certificated teachers was 74.2 per cent. of the total.

The following table gives an analysis of the qualifications, academic and professional, of these 10,215 teachers.

The distribution of certificated and uncertificated teachers, arranged according to Inspectors' Circuits, is given in the table below, from which it will be seen (a) that all the Transkeian Circuits had under 50 per cent. of certificated teachers, (b) that the North-western areas, of which Piquetberg, Van Rhy'n's Dorp and Fraserburg are the centres, were badly provided with certificated teachers, (c) that certain areas, including Dordrecht, Laingsburg, Fort Beaufort, Aliwal North, Mafeking, Bredasdorp, Steytlerville, Ladismith and King William's Town, had a large percentage of uncertificated teachers, and (d) that Malmesbury, Capetown, Worcester, Kimberley and East London Circuits alone had less than 20 per cent. of uncertificated teachers.

The percentage of male teachers was thus 35.2 of the total, a very slight increase as compared with the previous year. It may be confidently expected that the improved salaries now offered will induce more of the young men of the Cape Province to become teachers than in the past.

SUPPLY OF TEACHERS.—The main source of the supply of teachers is the student-teacher system, and it is satisfactory to be able to record that the number of student teachers undergoing a course of training continues to advance. Training Schools for European students are now established in twelve towns, while student teachers are also trained at many other places for a part of the prescribed course. It has been made imperative for each student to spend at least one year at a Training School.

Training Schools for non-European students are in operation at sixteen centres.

No departmental grants for the purchase of School Libraries were available. The falling off in the number of Private Farm Schools possessing libraries is explained by the fact that in many cases the books belong to the farmer, and when the school ceases to exist, the books are retained by him. In other cases, such as small country Third Class Schools, the Secretary of the School Board should, immediately he knows that the school is being closed, take steps to have the library transferred to another school.

All First Class Schools, Second Class Schools and Training Colleges are provided with libraries.

X. BUILDINGS.

The cost of material and the necessity for economy both combined to restrict expenditure. However, it was imperative that new buildings should be erected at some places, and that the existing accommodation should be extended at others. A sum amounting to £205,095 was expended on buildings during the year. The most important erections which were completed were: (a) new schools at Newlands, Woodstock (Regent Street), Philipstown, Rawsonville and Williston; (b) Training School Hostels at Paarl and Cradock; (c) Extensions at Ladismith, Heidelberg, Britstown, and Upper Paarl.

Whilst a gratifying increase in the amount of new school accommodation is to be recorded, the urgent demands for new school buildings are rapidly increasing in number, and if these are to be fairly met a very largely increased expenditure will become necessary for a considerable period.

XI. FINANCE.

APPORTIONMENT OF GOVERNMENT EXPENDITURE.—The expenditure on education during the year ending 31st March, 1917, was £976,294, as against £917,856 for the previous year. The following statement shows how these totals were made up:—

It will be seen that, leaving out of account the small concluding item, the greatest proportionate increases have been in connection with the training of teachers and with industrial schools. In comparison with similar administrations in other parts of the world, the Cape Education Department has always been distinguished for the relatively small sum expended on the head office; and this year that is the one item which shows a decrease, the expenditure having been actually £527 less and the percentage of the total being now 1·07 as against 1·19.

SCHOOL BOARD FINANCE.—At the end of 1916, school boards had under their control 2,729 schools, with 5,200 teachers and 100,748 scholars on the roll, the corresponding figures for the previous year having been 2,653 schools, 4,937 teachers, and 95,936 scholars. These figures should be borne in mind when consideration is given to the following statement of school board income and expenditure:—

It is still the case that nearly two-thirds of the total income is contributed by Government, though the actual percentage has fallen from 65·4 to 64·9.

XII. SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION.

The foregoing paragraphs have attempted to record in some detail the extent to which and the direction in which the work of the Department in the provision of schools and the control of school instruction has grown. It is necessary here to state that the conditions which have prevailed have rendered it impossible to give due attention to many most important educational matters. To mention but a few, there are the necessity for the re-consideration of the whole question of the nature of the curriculum provided for native schools and the training of native teachers; the organisation and development of industrial and technical education, and the modification of the plan for the ordinary school course to fit these claims; the demand for special attention to the needs of mentally defective pupils; the supply of school books and requisites. In all these and other matters, whilst the urgency of the claim has been fully appreciated in this Department, and indeed has been explicitly and strongly pressed upon it by representations from without, it has been possible to give it only the most inadequate and partial attention.

Towards the close of the year under review arrangements were discussed and finally agreed upon to carry out a re-organisation of the work of the Department, based upon a clear division of its activities into those of a technical nature and those of purely administrative character. This re-organisation has since been introduced; and it is to be trusted that, apart from the more direct control of expenditure which it is expected to produce, it will be one means of securing a more comprehensive and systematic survey of the educational questions to be dealt with and a more efficient means of providing the necessary subsequent constructive action.

Whilst recognising fully that so much has not been accomplished, it is yet a matter of great gratification to record that in almost all directions there has been a marked growth in the extent of the educational work of the Province. The statistics for the year indicate material and external growth; but along with that there has been increase in the interest taken in matters educational by the public at large, and a growth in the earnestness with which educational matters generally have been considered. This augurs well for future development.

During the past year the strain of war conditions has become yet more severe in respect of the difficulty of maintaining the necessary numerical strength and efficiency of the office staff; and this naturally has been felt more keenly in view of the very important and difficult task thrown upon the Office in the details of the application of the Teachers' Salaries Ordinance. It is only the continued attention and devotion to duty on the part of the members of the Office Staff which have made it possible to carry out all the details of the comprehensive grading of schools, revision of records, and the classification of the qualifications and salaries of teachers, whilst dealing with the constant heavy increase in the ordinary routine work due to the natural growth in school attendance. The experience of the past year has emphasised the urgent need for an increase in the number of responsible officers on the staff, if merely the ordinary work of the Department is to be carried on.

Recent legislation of a comprehensive and far-reaching nature will naturally demand new machinery for its administration, and it will be necessary to exercise some patience before expecting to see the actual results of such changed conditions.

In this period of national stress the attention of those concerned with the framing of educational laws and with the provision of the necessary funds for educational purposes has not been diverted from the primary importance of the child as the greatest asset of the nation.

A constant recognition of that truth should lie behind all educational administration, as its full realisation is the necessary condition of all educational progress.
