Dear General

This Mornings Post brought me your Letter of the 22 - which gave us all much pleasure - You must write me once more at furthest on Tuesday next - I am not sanguine in my expectation of a speedy recovery of poor Charles & the more glad I am that there is some symptom of abatement of his Disorder - You might have send the Letter from my N. & I wish you to do so in future if I think I had do so before - The chief & best contents is an order for Ten Cask's of Bl. Powder - He wants about 30 in all & 4 or 5 very small Cask's amongst them to send for trial to some friends at a distance, but he says such sized Cask's as the best will do - Tell Ethel to put only 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ of lead into the Bucket

for this order, for it cannot be as wrong
as that made by Lincolnton & Minkley,
a sample of which yet in a Wine Bottle
in Child's possession in the Court N. S.
Room - What we have also send abroad
now must discharge Judge's equally
as well as that that your Lincolnton & Minkley?
The rest of his letters contains family
news of a favourable & pleasant nature.
I suppose we must give James 70 shillings
for the food -

I would rather have something than
follow with the children.
We must send some O.W. to Glasgow
but it is well to be more than other
people sell -

Sophia & myself are just returned
from Young Aspholds journey - & have

hardly time to stop for dinner -
His playing has quite surpassed
my Expectation & I am sure he

& give her too, if you see her -
