want me to represent them

at the Conference on
the 8th - I have agreed,
I also on the 13th - if you
have arranged for
that.

I have thought that
it would not be right
to omit Mr Crawford
because her householders
League directly sets
the Suffrage on legitimate
lines.

I am glad you are
going to Sydneyham
on the 23rd - you may
have time there to tell me

about Newcastle.

If the King's Speech
is favourable, it may
fall relatively flat on
the audience, but things
will not at least be
settled by that time.

I think it will be a good
meeting on the 4th February
