Please forgive the  
liberty I am taking.  
My enthusiasm for women's  
suffrage must be my  
excuse. A letter appeared  
in the "Times" of Dec 27<sup>th</sup>  
under the head of "An  
unnoticed report of women's  
suffrage, signed 'Francis  
Low'. The writer reports  
various reasons against  
the granting of the vote to  
women - all of these

(to my mind) quite un-  
convincing, but probably  
not so to a large section  
of the Times readers.

The letter terminated by  
saying the Suffrage would  
not be extended without  
ascertaining whether  
the majority of women  
are in favour of it.

I expected to see this  
letter answered in  
the situation of women's  
suffrage, but no answer  
appeared. In to day's

issue of the "Enquirer" I  
see 2 letters with expressing  
the views expressed in the  
letter of the 27<sup>th</sup> December.

I am writing this  
merely in case these  
letters have been over-  
looked by you, and  
the hope that you will  
see your way to replying  
to them. I feel  
convinced that there is  
a large section of people  
who are influenced to

a great degree by letters  
in the paper or who  
considers that if a  
letter is unanswered  
it is therefore unans-  
-werable.

Please forgive the

suggestion. I know no

the subject.
