Sir,

In the name of the Ealing and Acton Independent Branch of the London Society for Women's Suffrage, we would ask your earnest consideration of the enclosed resolution.

Though Suffragists have refrained from demanding a Government measure of Women's Suffrage since the outbreak of War, they have not wavered in their belief in the justice of the Suffrage cause.

Any further extension of the Franchise to men would seriously prejudice the position of women, and we trust that no such extension shall be made unless women are included.

During the time of hostilities women have responded loyally to every demand that has been made upon them, and the need of their help will be far greater while the difficult work of reconstruction claims the energies of the Nation.
