Friends, I am more sorry than I can tell you that I cannot yet come to our prisoners dinner, the excitement of great joy, it is thought, would throw me back and I want to get well as soon as possible. Every time that I have been to this feast I have thought the little address that each one gave more remarkable, more intensely varied, more absorbingly interesting. Now as we each of us look back, 5 year ago, on our imprisonment at Stolloway, ~~that~~ although the sufferings of our fellows in prison are so much greater now and the fight has become much fiercer to some, yet ~~that~~ it was truly a beginning, a baptism of fire, and that whatever the camp in which we may now find ourselves, we have grown in this woman's movement startlingly beyond our vision in 1909.
