examinations and thus
make themselves equally
qualified as men to
apply for any appoint-
ment offered - Your idea
of having the Chapter
on Pharmacy in your book
printed separately & sent
to the hospitals & via
sold one in it would
suggest to many the
idea of employing women
who had never before
thought of such a thing.
It is my intention
eventually to open a

Chop in London, but of
course this step requires
some consideration and
experience - I hope you
will excuse the liberty
I take in thus writing
to you,
