into the Chew Vest until it
just wears away. He will
not feel the change there -
Or for the present it's
best for me not to put too
much on my letters. I
will only say that we
are well looked after &
have received very attention.

I thought I might be able to do
some fancy work. I could do
a bit of work for each of
you. When the votes come you
ought like to keep it in my
memory of this gift. I can
only say I am thankful
I have done it. If the votes
don't come this year. yet a few
spent & outlook in woman
is busy out till freedom
cause till death is our
motto. My mind & heart
are full of my dear ones
My dear Mother & father
& Marks will be with me

untill Duddy in my
cell. The walls of which
are a mere shadow.
I think you can send
things to the prisoners
of Holloway asking
that they be given to
Nellie Taylor, in
Bretton ^{a Suffollette} ~~Wesley~~ ^{the}
prisoners under his
care - give my love to
dear Frank - but don't
I could not be here to fight
& what better thanks comes I
give her - Goodbye my
darlings John & my
mother
