May I take this opportunity
of telling you informally that

at the Central Bureau we
have again been asked to
organise an Inquiry Office in
connection with women's work
at the coming International
Exhibition similar to the one
at the Franco-British
Exhibition, except that this
year we shall be allowed to
sell, whereas last year we
could only distribute gratis
literature. It involves heavy

expense, and in the first
place we are endeavouring to
ascertain what measure of
support we should receive. Our
proposal is that the subscription
of £1.1.0 shall include representa-
tion at the Workers' Bookshop
& also at the Exhibition, but that
an additional fee of 5s. shall
be charged for each photograph or
advertisement (not exceeding 12" x 15")
