ONE HALFPENNY.

Halt!

The Nation and The Christian Commonwealth join hands this week in urging the Government to come to their senses before a tragic crisis is reached in the Woman Suffrage movement. The Nation pleads for a suspension of hostilities on both sides, and for a reconsideration of their position by the Liberal leaders. "Since we know the Government to be the stronger, we would invite them to take the first step." Whether the Government or the Suffragists are the stronger remains yet to be proved but undoubtedly it is for the Government to take the first step. From the very beginning, when they first refused to recognize as political prisoners women guilty of only a technical breach of the law the onus of responsibility has lain on the shoulders of the Government; and as the movement has progressed step by step to the present state of serious warfare, that responsibility has only deepened.

Mr. Philip Snowden's prophecy in *The Christian Common*wealth would certainly prove correct. In the event of Mr. Asquith giving a definite pledge to make Woman Suffrage a Government measure, all militant tactics would, *ipso facto*, cease. Before every militant action this essentially fair offer has been laid before the Prime Minister : each time it has been scornfully rejected. That the Prime Minister will reconsider his attitude of blind obstinacy is too much to hope for at the present crisis. Mr. Asquith seems bent upon his own destruction.

The siege of Westminster and the dramatic hunger-strike startled the jaded public into interest some months ago; but the splendid devotion of the woman would soon have palled upon the mob. Familiarity even with heroism breeds indifference. But the Government finding their prestige lowered, in their irritation resorted to forcible methods of feeding, and a fire of indignation flamed through the country from end to end. When called upon to justify his action Mr. Gladstone wavered like a weathercock in a hurricane; first seven prisoners were being fed by force—then only one was receiving this treatment; they were being fed through the nostrils, great indignation that anything else should be suggested !—Yes, the stomach tube had been required; permission for a solicitor's visit was refused —and then permitted. So Mr. Gladstone vacillates, blown about by every wind of opinion.

Meantime prominent women Liberals, finding themselves more woman than Liberal, are resigning their positions. While Mr. Lloyd George sneers at "hirelings," well-known journalists are refusing to sell their honour with their pens. Liberal electors, both humble and influential, are seceding from a party that has smirched its escutcheon. These are the signs and portents of the heavens—to be read and understanded of the wise.

True Liberals.

SUFFRAGISTS throughout the country have been touched to admiration for the splendid action of Mr. H. W. Nevinson and Mr. H. N. Brailsford in resigning their positions on *The Daily News.* This has been done as a protest against the attitude of that journal in regard to the violence of the Government

towards the women imprisoned in Birmingham. "We cannot denounce torture in Russia," they write in a letter to *The Times* of October 5th, "and support it in England, nor can we advocate democratic principles in the name of a party which confines them to a single sex."

At a time when the Liberal Government lies bound in the chains of political hypocrisy and selfishness, traitor to the tenets it professes, it is impossible to pay too high a tribute to these two Liberal men. They have dared to expose the lip service which present-day Liberalism pays to freedom; they have dared to put principle before party, and at great personal disadvantage to teach the Government the old apostolic lesson that faith without works is dead.

Sauce for the Gander.

ONCE again has a constitutional effort been made to persuade Mr. Asquith to receive a deputation of Suffragists. Once again has the utter futility of such attempts been demonstrated. Once again has the wail of the constitutional women ascended to heaven. Correspondence on the subject has taken place between Mrs. Fawcett and the Premier. True, Mr. Asquith has admitted that such a request, proceeding from the National Union of Suffrage Societies "stands on a totally different footing from similar demands put forward by those who have for the last three years been discrediting the movement by methods of petty annoyance and open violence." This is a great result to have gained ! Meanwhile the less docile section of the movement are asking what good behaviour has profited their sisters. It is increasingly obvious every day that, though Mr. Asquith finds violence a convenient rock to crouch behind, he has never had the slightest intention of yielding to dignified persuasion what he withholds from more strenuous agitation.

the signtest intention of yielding to tignined persuasion what he withholds from more strenuous agitation. To this question of "violence," however, it is well to remember that there are two sides. We should like Mr. Gladstone's definition. We have been hearing much lately about stonethrowing, the sentences it has incurred with their forcible accompaniments. These latter are justified by Mr. Gladstone, virtuously indignant. "Public officials have the same right to protection as private persons, though they may be policemen, prison officials, or even Cabinet Ministers." Just so, but private individuals seem to forfeit their right to protection when they become Suffragists. Almost every one of our speakers has had stones flung at her on some occasion. We have not forgotten the disgraceful scenes at Maidstone, when a perfect shower of missiles greeted Mrs. Despard, who was injured on the forehead. We have not heard of sentences of hard labour inflicted on these "hooligans"; in fact, strange to say, there was no question even of arrest. These things should give pause to those Liberal members whose only thought (according to P. W. W. in *The Daily News*) was for their "great leader" in his hour of peril ! It would seem to us rather as if the police behind whom he hides so assiduously—faced the danger, if danger there be, or the people who use the underground passages which have now become the Prime Minister's happy hunting grounds !

Two of our members are to have an interview with Mr. Winston Churchill when he visits Dundee. To quote The "The concession has been wrung from the President Courier : of the Board of Trade at the point of the bayonet. Swearing that he would ne'er consent in December last, he veered round in a few weeks, and though later Mr. Churchill endeavoured to establish conditions, he has now unconditionally surrendered. The tale is a pretty one, and shows that the determination of the Suffragists is unlimited."

Last December Miss Clunas, Secretary of our Dundee branch, received a promise, after much correspondence, from Mr. Churchill that the next time he visited Dundee he would receive a deputation from the Dundee Branch. To quote The Courier again

There the matter ended for the time, and if Mr. Churchill had forgotten about the correspondence the Suffragists hadn't. At the beginning of September, when the preliminary announcements were made that Mr. Churchill was to visit the constituency in October, Miss Clunas was at him again. Her letter was a pointed reminder of his promises to receive the deputation.

'I am desired,' replied Mr. Marsh, 'by Mr. Churchill to say that he will be willing to receive a deputation from the Women's Freedom League during his visit to Dundee on condition that no attempt is made by any members of that League to make disorderly interruptions at meetings. On receiving a guarantee to this effect Mr. Churchill will ask Mr. Husband (who has his arrangements in charge) to appoint a time for the deputation.'

Miss Clunas replied hot haste thus : 'I have in my possession a letter from you, dated January 2nd, 1909, in which you promised, without making any conditions whatsoever, to receive on your next visit to Dundee a deputation from the Dundee Branch of the Women's Freedom League on the question of Woman Suffrage, and also a letter, dated January 21st, 1909, in which you agreed that the hour fixed for such a deputation should be after 4 P.M. I expect you to fulfil the promises made in these two letters, and await to hear from you the date of the deputation. A COMPLETE CAPITULATION.

" As a reply did not come to this letter, Miss Clunas wrote again, enclosing copies of Mr. Churchill's letters promising to receive a deputation, and adding : 'The branch expects you as an honourable man to keep your word. I await, therefore, to hear from you the time fixed for this deputation.'

After some further correspondence with Mr. Churchill's agent, the time and place of the interview were finally fixed.

We congratulate Miss Clunas on sticking so closely to her guns. If Mr. Churchill, however, had taken the trouble to find out a little about the different Suffrage societies, he would have known that it was unnecessory to ask for such a promise from a member of the Women's Freedom League.

Scotland.

From time to time open-air meetings have been held outside the large factories at Shieldhall, Govan, and on Wednesday, September 29th, a large meeting was held in the Cressy Hall under the auspices of the Scottish Council, and, with Miss Eunice Murray as chairwoman, and Miss Anna Munro and Mrs. Borrmann Wells as speakers, a splendid start was made. New members were numerous, and a large collection was taken.

On Thursday, October 7th, Miss Eunice Murray spoke to a large audience at mid-day, and in the evening I held the second branch meeting.
