bed - I posted two  
letters for her, one to  
you & one to Mrs. Wilks  
but she said she  
had written both to me



& others but mine, at  
any rate, was not  
received.

I have made it known  
as much as possible  
that people should  
enquire for her &c &  
I will go down again  
& see Miss Harding.

There is no mention of  
her in today's "Suffragette"  
either what I sent has  
been crowded out or <sup>some</sup>  
the staff on the paper  
may be away.

I will tell Miss Harding  
again the circumstances  
& ask her to see  
that it goes into the  
paper next week.

My mother keeps much  
the same. She is very  
feeble, & it is only a  
question as to how  
long her strength lasts.

Mr. Evans is looking  
forward to seeing  
you on Sunday.
