CHELSEA COMMITTEE FOR EUROPEAN RELIEF

December 1950.

THE CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE is now Mr. John Yeoman, of 42 Tite Street, elected in succession to the Rev. Dr. C.T. Chapman, who has left Chelsea. The Committee are most grateful to Dr. Chapman for his help and much regret his departure. — Mr. Yeoman who was in Germany as Education Officer after the war, has for the last year been organizing the hospitality given by this Committee to German Foreign Office visitors. Dr. Chapman has consented to remain a member of the Committee as he will be in London from time to time.

We also regret that Mrs. Frank Byers is leaving Chelsea and has therefore resigned from the Committee. Miss M.C. Challen has been elected a member.

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THE APPEAL FOR A GREEK VILLAGE issued in July was a great success. We received £63.19.10 in donations, and clothing, tools, and kitchen utensils, insured at the lowest estimate for Customs duties for about £100⁸⁰ £53.9.1 were spent on cooking pots, and spades, Red Cross supplies and sewing materials, £5.13.9 on expenses, and the remainder sent to the Help To Greece Advisory Committee through which the appeal was made. In all, 19 cases were sent from Chelsea, but owing to a hold-up in shipping arrangements these did not go till September. It was therefore decided not to continue this appeal until at any rate news is received of the safe arrival of this consignment. (We would have liked to notify this to our supporters, but it must be borne in mind that each circularisation costs us about £4.0.0 in printing, stamps, and envelopes). In this appeal we were helped by M. Alexio, the Proprietor of the Unity Restaurant, King's Road.

THE DEPOT is still, owing to the kindness of Mrs. Sanger, at 58 Oakley Street, but we wish now to make special efforts from time to time rather than deal with a constant stream of gifts.

OUR NEXT APPEAL WILL BE IN FEBRUARY, for the Save the Children Fund. A Meeting will be held in the Hall of Remembrance, Flood Street.
