The Report on the Census of Production for 1958

Part 63. MOTOR VEHICLE MANUFACTURING

This report on the Motor Venicle Manufacturing Industry relates to establishments engaged in the manufacture and assembly of passenger cars, commercial goods vehicles, buses, trolley buses, wheeled tractors, works trucks, motor-drawn trailers and caravans, and parts and accessories for such vehicles including bodies, chassis and chassis frames for cars and commercial vehicles,
cabs for commercial vehicles, motor body shells, internal combustion engines, axles, brakes fuel injection pumps, gear boxes, heaters, hoods, propeller shafts, radiators and radiator blocks, registration plates, shock absorbers and dampers, steering gear, tipping gear, wheels and windscreen wipers (not electrical) and other nonelectrical parts and accessories except instruments, gaskets and jointings. The report includes three-wheel tractors, battery-electric vehicles and works trucks but other three-wheel vehicles are excluded. The industry corresponds to minimum list heading 381 of the second (1958) edition of the Standard Industrial Classification, which has been used for the first time in the 1958
Census. Census.

This industry formed part of Industry 31 in the reports on the last detailed Census of Production, for 1954. The Motor Cycle, Three-wheel Vehicle and Pedal Cycle Manufacturing Industry, which also formed part of Industry 31, now corresponds to minimum list heading 382 and is the subject of a separate report, Part 64, for 1958. Crawler tractors, formerly included in Industry 31, now form part of minimum list heading 336 and are included in the report on Contractors' Plant and Quarrying Machinery (Part 47) ; armoured cars, formerly included in Industry 4I (Mechanical Engineering (General) are now included in this industry; electrical accessories and other
 inimu list headin 349 and Industry (Part 53).
ustry (Part 53).
For 1958, returns in full detail were required only from firms employing twenty-five or more persons and most of the tables in this report relate only to these larger firms. This is an important change from previous censuses when returns in full detail were required from firms employing eleven or more persons on productive work. Estimates for the industry as a whole are
given in Table l.

The figures given for 1954 correspond as closely as possible to those collected for 1958 but the correspondence is not exact, especially in respect of the small firms who gave only limited information. Some other changes introduced in the 1958 Census also affect the comparability between 1954 and 1958 figures; these are explained in the notes prefacing this report.

## METHOD OF CLASSIFICATIO

This industry is defined in terms of its 'principal products' which are those shown in Table 4. A census return was classified to this industry if the sales of the principal products of this industry accounted for a greater proportion of its output than the principal products of any other industry. Where, however, the application of this rule would have resulted in a change of classification between 1954 (on the revised basis) and 1958, the return was classified to the (88190)
same industry as for 1954 unless the output of principal products in the new industry was one third more than in the old; this modification of the general rule was designed to avoid discontinuities as the result of marginal changes of output between the two censuses. Sales of merchanted products and of non-specific items such as waste products, work done and canteen akings were not taken into account in classifying returns

A slightly different procedure was followed in classifying to the sub-divisions of the industry shown in Table 2, the sub-divisions being defined in terms of their characteristic products'. The numbers shown in the left hand column of Table 4 identify the sub-division of which the item is a characteristic product. A census return was classified to a particular subdivision only if more than 50 per cent. of the total value of goods sold and work done (excluding merchanted goods and canteen takings) consisted of characteristic products of the sub-divisions. was classified to 'Other' . The thatal in no case exceeded 50 per cent. of the total, the return ncludes, besides the products thich value of sales of characteristic products shown in Table 2 closely related to products generally taken into account in determining the classification to sub-divisions.
