The Report on the Census of Production for 1958

Part 38. IRON AND STEEL (GENERAL)

This report on the Iron and Steel (General) Industry relates to establishments engaged in the manufacture of puddled and wrought iron, and steel. It includes establishments engaged in the production of pig iron (in integrated steel works). ferro-manganese or spiegeleisen at blast furnaces (including ore preparation plants): making alloy or carbon steel in furnaces or converters; rolling (including re-rolling and cold rolling) steel into semi-finished or finished forms; the production of castings in steel foundries; the production of railway and tramway tyres, wheels and axles, points, switches and crossings; colliery arches; bright bars and heavy forgings: steel plates and sheets (including coated and corrugated sheets) in cut lengths or coils; tinplate, terne-plate and blackplate; and semi-finished material for conversion into is excla whe. The production of tubes, wire, drop forgings, drop stampings and hot pressings f Stand of the Standard Industrial Classification, which has been used for the first time in the 1958
Census.

This industry corresponds broadly to Industries 3A (Blast Furnaces), 3B (Iron and Steel (Melting and Rolling)), 3D (Steel Sheets) and 3E (Tinplate) in the reports on the last detailed Census of Production, for 1954, but particulars relating to blast furnaces other than those in thrat integrated with tube lron Castings, etc. Industry (Part 40) or in the case of blast furnaces refined pig iron and of ferro-alloys other than in try Report (Part 39). There were no establishments in this industry in Northern Ireland in 1954 or in 1958.

This industry is defined in terms of its 'principal products' which are those shown in Table 4. A census return was classified to this industry if the sales of the principal products of this industry accounted for a greater proportion of its output than the principal products of any other industry. Where, however, the application of this rule would have resulted in a change of classification between 1954 (on the revised basis) and 1958, the return was classified to the same industry as for 1954 unless the output of principal products in the new industry was one third more than in the old; this modification of the general rule was designed to avoid discontinuities as the result of marginal changes of output between the two censuses. Sales of merchanted products and of non-specific items such as waste products, work done and canteen takings were not taken into account in classifying returns.

A somewhat different procedure was followed in classifying to the sub-divisions of the industry shown in Table 2, the sub-divisions being defined in terms of their characteristic products'. The census returns were first classified to the sub-divisions for 'Wrought iron works, including puddling furnaces' and 'Work done on commission and other work done' if more than 50 per cent. of the total value of goods sold and work done (excluding merchanted goods and canteen takings) consisted of characteristic products of these sub-divisions. The remaining returns were first divided into two broad groups according to whether the return indicated that melting was carried on by the firm concerned. Returns in the 'Steel manufacture with melting' group were then allocated to the 'Castings' sub-division if castings accounted for more than 0 per cent. of total sales: A similar procedure was used for classifying the returns. in the 'Steel manafacture without melting' group, the 50 per cent. rule being used to allocate returns to each of the three specialist sub-divisions and the remaining returns being allocated to the 'Other steel manufacture without melting' sub-division. It should be noted, however, that the figures given for characteristic products in both the 'Steel manufacture with melting, other' and the 'Steel manufacture without melting, other' sub-divisions include the value of sales on returns classified to these sub-divisions of any principal products of the industry which are not characteristic products of the sub-divisions for 'Wrought iron works, including puddling furnaces' and 'Work done on commission and other work done'. In all sub-divisions the value of sales of characteristic products also includes other items of output assumed to be closely related to them, e.g. waste products and non-specific work done, but such items were not generally taken into account in determining the classification to sub-divisions.
