THE CANVAS GOODS AND SACK TRADE

INTRODUCTORY

This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture and repair of sacks and bags and the making-up of canvas goods.

Firms engaged in re-conditioning sacks and bags solely for their own use were excluded from the Import Duties Act Inquiries of 1934 and 1933, but included in the Census for each of the other years. The effect of the inclusion of such firms in 1935 and 1930 is shown in Table I A.
