## LINEN AND SOFT HEMP

THIS REPORT on the Linen and Soft Hemp Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the spinning and weaving of linen and soft hemp and in making-up for sale household textiles of linen and union cloth.

This industry together with the Flax Processing Industry corresponds to minimum list heading 115 and part of $122(2)$ in the Standard Industrial Classification.

Certain figures for Northern Ireland are not strictly comparable with those for Great Britain. In Northern Ireland returns were obtained from firms engaged in the spinning, weaving, threadmaking, and textile converting and making-up sections of the industry, and firms engaged in two or more of these activities were required to make separate returns in each. Thus, transfers between departments that in Great Britain would normally be considered one establishment (e.g.. transfers of yarn from a spinning to a weaving department) are recorded in Northern Ireland figures as sales of output and purchases of materials. The Northern Ireland figures for analysis according to specialisation, the sales of principal products, the sales of other than principal products, and the purchase of materials and fuel have been shown, therefore, in separate Tables 4, 5, 7 and 9, immediately following those for Great Britain.

In the weaving, textile converting and making-up sections of the industry in Northern Ireland, no distinction was made between establishments dealing with linen cloth and those dealing with cloths of distinction was made between establishments dealing with linen clay, rayon, nylon, etc., all being included in this industry.
