147 Toys, games, childrens' carriages and sports equipment

This Report on the Toys, Games, Children's Carriages and Sports Equipment Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing children's toys of all kinds (except rubber toys), children's bicycles, scooters and tricycles, indoor games, including chess and draughts sets and jigsaw puzzles, and conjuring apparatus; perambulators, push chairs, folding baby carriages, invalid carriages, etc; including parts such as wheels and axles; sports and gymnastic equipment and requisites. Playing cards, powered invalid carriages, sports nets, billiard tables and bagatelle boards are excluded.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 494 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 census.

The industry corresponds to the Toys, Games and Sports Equipment Industry (Part 122) in the Reports on the last detailed Census of Production for 1963, except that perambulators, push chairs, etc and invalid carriages which were shown in the Report on Perambulators, Hand-trucks, etc (Part 67) are now included.

Throughout this Report the figures given for 1963 have been re-classified, as far as possible, according to the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) so that data for 1963 and 1968 are on the same industrial basis. However the reclassification of small firms, which provided limited information only has been arbitrary.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv).
