## wooden containers and baskets

THIS REPORT on the Wooden Containers and Baskets Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of cooperage products and parts, of wooden boxes, packing cases² and similar containers, in preparing canes and osiers, and in manufacturing baskets, hampers punnets, etc

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 173 in the Standard Industrial Classification.

Philanthropic institutions that produced basketware are included.
Establishments in this industry in 1948 and 1951 were not separately classified in Northern Ireland. Those mainly producing wooden crates and boxes in those years were included in the Timber Industry (Volume 10, Industry A) and those mainly producing baskets, etc., were included in the Furniture and Upholstery Industry (Volume 10. Industry B) ; no larger establishments mainly manufacturing cooperage products were recorded.
