THIS REPORT on the Building Materials Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the treatment of stone (including manufacture of monumental masonry) and in the manufacture mainly in the treatment of stone (including manufacture of monumental masonry) and in the manufactu
of slate goods (except slates for roofing and damp courses), roofing felts, prefabricated concrete of slate goods (except slates for roofing and damp courses), roofing felts, prefabricated concrete
products, artificial paving stones, asbestos cement goods, lime, plaster of paris, etc. Firms that products, artificial paving stones, asbestos cement goods, ime, plaster of, paris, etaliferous Mines and Quarries (other than Coal. Salt and Slate) (Volume 1, Industry B).

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 29(2) in the Standard Industrial Classification together with heading 29(3) apart from manufactured fuel, plumbago crucibles, ceramic glazes and frits graphite and mica goods.

For 1951 and 1954, manufacturers of asphalt who were using the whole or the greater part of their production in their own contracting work are classified to the Building and Contracting Industry (Volume 12, Industry A), whereas for 1948 they were classified to this industry; the 1948 figure d to $£ 4,146,000$
For 1954, manufacturers of roofing felts have been included, whereas for earlier years they were covered in a separate report (Volume 1. Industry M). The 1948 and 1951 figures have been amended to include these establishments.
