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

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Preface

This book is about practical economy: how much people in certain professions have earned in Britain this century and what items have cost them. *The Value of a Pound* is a unique guide comparing the changes in real earnings against those in real retail prices through the 20th century.

In The Value of a Pound, statistics on earnings for a number of professions - for example, coal miners, teachers, doctors, clerical workers - are followed by prices for food and general items, making possible comparisons between what people earned and what they could afford with their wages as the century progressed. Certain regional variations are taken into account where information is available. To give a wider context to the information, national statistics are given on unemployment and employment, on consumer expenditure, on personal finance, and on the balance of payments. A number of stocks, commodities, and foreign currencies' exchange rates are also charted across the century. Interesting miscellaneous tables have been added at the end of many chapters. In all, the book presents a unique view of British earnings and prices, and hence of British society, through the 20th century.

Organization

The book contains eleven chapters, divided by period. The chapter periods are:

All of the chapters follow a standard format.

Historical Introduction – A background essay describing the major social and economic forces of the period.

Historical Snapshot – A chronology of key economic and historic events.

Earnings and Employment – This section is divided into subsections on:

Earnings, Standard Table(s): which give(s) a selection of national average weekly or annual earnings paid for spe-

cific jobs or within particular professional areas, traced annually.

Regional Earnings by Selected Occupation: the tables up to 1968 give statistics by town and by specific industry. From 1970 the statistics are by region.

Incomes, Miscellaneous: includes data on women's earnings, certain industry sectors, and in a few cases a certain company, some miscellaneous regional earnings, and in the later chapters, details on high earners.

Employment: comprises unemployment and employment figures, and regional information (as available).

Consumer Expenditure - Includes:

Consumer Expenditure, Standard Table: shows annual consumer expenditure figures in the UK, divided into ten areas of expenditure.

Regional Household Expenditure: from chapter 7 this table reports on the variations of expenditure between regions. In chapter 7 the table covers average weekly household expenditure, average weekly expenditure per capita, and average weekly expenditure on housing. The table in chapter 8 covers the above, and average weekly income by household and by person. Chapters 9, 10 and 11 cover the UK regions by areas of expenditure.

Households with Certain Durable Goods: This table features in chapters 10 and 11, and shows the proportion of households in the regions of the UK possessing durable goods such as a television, a telephone, central heating, a video, a home computer, etc.

Prices – This section includes tables on food prices followed by tables on general articles.

Food Basket: a report of a standard food basket. The pricing is compiled from information supplied for the Cost of Living Index which started in 1914, and then for the Index of Retail Prices, which replaced the Cost of Living Index from 1956. Some items featured change over the century, reflecting food fashions and availability.

Miscellaneous Food Prices Tables: includes food budgets for types of families and regional food prices.

Prices, General Articles: a selection of representative items tracked annually, allowing the reader to trace price fluctuations. During the century, new brands appear and disappear. An effort was made in the gathering of this information to trace products over long periods of time.

Prices, Selected: features a table of priced items selected from advertisements and catalogues of the given period. In the main, the prices are cited from advertisements in magazines, newspapers, sales catalogues, and on posters, or come from company archives. The items are divided first alphabetically by subheadings according to type. The order within these subheadings is then according to the year of the publication in which the items feature, and within the year of publication, the order is alphabetical by title. Where available there is a description of each item and the source of the advertisement provides indications of geographical differences in prices. The date of the advertisement in which the price was offered is provided in the sources column. This section can be used both to track standard items across periods, for example telephone tariffs, and to look at miscellany which reflect the particular concerns of the period, such as a gas mask container in the war. To a certain extent the items covered reflect the range of goods available in each given period and the changing interests of and possibilities for the consumer across the century. These sections can be used to encourage students to pick out basic items in a household budget.

Finance and Economic Data – Provides data on personal finance, stocks and shares and government data.

Finance, Personal: provides details of annual changes in income tax rates, old age pension, base interest rates, and child benefit.

Highest Closing Price of UK Major Stocks: monitors a selection of 12 large UK companies' stocks.

Commodities: tracks a selection of six important commodities: coal, cotton, gold, sugar, wheat and wool.

Foreign Exchange Rates: features annual sterling exchange rates against the mark, the franc, and the dollar. An exchange rate against the mark was not available during some of the war years.

Balance of Payments

Gross National Product (GNP) at Factor Cost and Its Component Incomes at Current Prices: national accounts compiled by the Central Statistical Office.

Miscellaneous – This section contains tables with data that does not fit into the above categories but that may be interesting to the reader or student. The table headings explain the contents, for example giving details on savings, or on rationing during the war.

Sources

A wide number of sources, from government statistics to company archives, has been used and cited in *The Value of a Pound*. Until 1944, the collation of government statistics was in its infancy. Newspapers, magazines, and some government reports served as the primary resources for this period. During the war years less information was available, therefore less is reported than in other chapters.

Users

The Value of a Pound will be of interest to students and teachers of economic history, and to school classes studying 20th-century British history, economics and society.

Specialized researchers and members of the public wishing to study how prices and expenditure have changed in comparison to incomes over different time spans, from generation to generation, and from profession to profession this century should find much of value in the book.

The Value of a Pound will therefore be of wide interest and of particular assistance to students searching for comparative statistics on earnings and prices.

This book has been put together from government statistics, company archives, books, magazines, and newspapers. During the Edwardian period, British exports accounted for a substantial part of the world market: total exports were worth £291 million in 1900 and £525 million in 1913. Britain produced approximately half of the world's pig iron in the 1870s; by 1914 this had fallen to one-eighth. Comparatively, its rate of growth in production was lower than both the US and Germany; by 1914 both countries had overtaken it in steel production. Only in shipbuilding and shipping did Britain retain its enormous market advantage.

Britain's general price level had risen since 1898, creating an atmosphere of optimism within the business community. However, this was not reflected in other areas of the country. The extravagance of the aristocracy contrasted badly with the misery of the 'sweated trades', and the increasing militancy of a working class affected by rising prices (the average wage in 1914 was just over 30 shillings a week – insufficient to maintain the average family). The violence of the suffragette movement, the battle between the House of Lords and the House of Commons, and the growing conflict in Ireland added to the sense of tension and the need for change.

Living conditions had not altered greatly among the working class since 1900 when Seebohm and Rowntree conducted their social survey in York and found that the average household did not possess a bath. Rowntree estimated that the subsistence wage needed to support a family of five was 21s.8d. However, in 1906 a Government Earnings Enquiry indicated that the average weekly wage in the cotton trade was 29s.6d., in public utilities 28s.1d., and in agriculture approxi-

mately 20s. It was not surprising that the charitable work-houses established during the Victorian era were still very popular.

Although the infant mortality rate had fallen from its average of 15 per cent of live births per annum between 1841 and 1870, it was still high at 10 per cent of live births in 1910. However, in areas of concentrated population and deprivation, such as the East End of London, this figure was much higher. The novelist Jack London asserted, in *People of the Abyss* (1903), that 55 per cent of children died before the age of five in the East End, compared to 18 per cent in the West End of London.

The Booth and Rowntree surveys indicated that almost one-third of the population was unable to afford enough to eat. Similarly, L.C. Money, in his book *Riches and Poverty*, estimated that almost half of National Income went to one-ninth of the population. The building boom of the latter half of this period slightly alleviated chronic overcrowding, but the great urban poverty found in most of Britain's towns and cities was an inescapable fact.

However, the Edwardian period was also important in the rise of the middle class, and in the growth of suburban living. Family life became centred around the semi-detached house; employment was found in the clerical sections of the expanding banking and financial sectors; and practically every middle-class household had servants, most of whom were aware of their 'place' in the existing social hierarchy.

On the political front, the Conservative Party lost its seat in the House of Commons in the General Election of 1905; it was succeeded by the Liberal Party. However many of the proposed Liberal reforms were overruled by the predominantly Conservative House of Lords. Traditional Conservatives ('Tories') could not accept the level and rate of change. The notions of meritocracy or that David Lloyd George, the son of a village schoolmaster, brought up by a shoemaker uncle, could become a Cabinet Minister, were completely unacceptable. The subsequent election of 1910 saw the Liberals return with an even larger majority.

Thus the period 1900-1913 was one of great change and development. The contrast between the extravagance of the aristocracy, and the poverty of the working-class majority

was exacerbated by the rise in prices and fall in the standard of living for most of the population. The women's movement and the rise of trade union activity indicated that large sections of the population were unhappy with the paternalism and class consciousness of British society.

However, it was with the advent of war and in the years that followed that the nation experienced substantial social and economic change. As Olive Heseltine wrote in *Lost Continent* (1948) 'although the high noon of Victorian greatness was past, sunshine still glowed on its afternoon tea. Not for a moment could they [the upper and middle classes] have

dreamed that their civilization, so slowly and painfully elaborated, so orderly, respectable and enlightened, would twice be mortally assailed; that their grand-daughters, slumbering peacefully in their perambulators, would find themselves maids of all work in unheated houses, cooking, sweeping, scrubbing, minding babies, tending sick-beds, standing eternally in queues; whilst their grandsons, who had faced death in African deserts, Asiatic jungles and Arctic seas, discharged from hospitals, from mental homes, from German prison camps, returned at last to help wash dishes, black the boots, and carry up the coals... '.

Britain declared war on Germany on 4th August 1914, officially because Germany had violated a joint treaty obligation to respect the neutrality of Belgium. However other reasons also came into play: it was Britain's traditional defence strategy to make sure that the low countries were not dominated by a hostile power; the naval agreements with France made it morally necessary to stand by the French in case of war; and finally a deep-rooted fear of German naval power impelled Britain to avoid isolation in a world of international fear and

However, the immense loss of life and expenditure on munitions during 1915 brought home to the British public that this was an entirely different kind of war. The concept of total warfare, in which professional fighting men were the spearhead and the framework for an all-out national effort in a life or death struggle, was too new to be easily accepted. At first, Britain, like most other nations involved in the war estimated the fighting would be over in six months but no-one anticipated the political deadlock that followed. War of this kind had not happened before.

There were an unprecedented number of deaths and casualties. Britain and the member countries of the Empire lost 1.1 million men and women; 1.5 million people from France and its colonies died; and some 2 million Germans were killed. Between 1914 and 1917 Russia experienced almost as many losses as all of the Allies put together.

On the political front, Asquith's Coalition Government (a mixture of Conservative and Liberal Party politicians) struggled to control these cataclysmic events. A century of near peace had not prepared the British political (or military) machine for this kind of situation. Asquith was a skilled parliamentarian but was unfit in both temperament and experience to conduct a war. At the end of 1916 Asquith was ousted from power by David Lloyd George. The change was justified by the need to reorganize the central machinery of government. Lloyd George created the War Cabinet to simplify decision making and shorten lines of responsibility. A much closer relationship developed between the political decision-makers and the senior military leaders, presided over by the Prime Minister. On the whole, David Lloyd George was responsible for the machinery and the development of central government during this period.

Once victory had been achieved by the Allies (the German Kaiser abdicated on 9th November 1918 and an armistice was signed two days later) the cost of war proved much greater than had originally been envisaged in 1914. Throughout the war years taxes met less than 30 per cent of the Government's expenditure. Loans were raised on unnecessarily expensive terms. Until the last 18 months of the war financial policy was highly inflationary in its effects. When the war ended purchasing power was roughly one-third of what it had been in 1914. The price of victory continued during the post-war years: in heavy taxes, economic tensions and crises, and international frictions.

The war had interrupted the natural path of social change. While, temporarily at least, bringing more women in the labour force, it also helped to contract the process of natural thought and intellectual development. The highly successful use of propaganda and the promotion of nationalism helped to introduce a spirit of conformity and an intolerance of individuality and of social and cultural deviation.

World War I forced people out of traditional and conventional patterns of peace time existence. From sleepy hamlets, comfortable suburban households, and the festering slums of the big cities, six million men had gone to fight in conditions which went far beyond their wildest nightmares. From the sheltered family environment, women had to drive trams or work in the munitions factories. Patterns of behaviour, expectations, and morals were changed by this experience. Whatever the nostalgic older generation of the time desired, these changes could never be reversed.

The years preceding the war had been marked by great industrial unrest and even violence. With the outbreak of World War I the trade unions (which had been growing gradually in membership and strength) called an industrial truce. The Government, for its part, was forced to acknowledge the vital part the working class had played in the war effort. The enforcement of arbitration in certain key industrial disputes in this period involved an unprecedented recognition of the rights and status of labour. The influence of the advance of the Labour movement can be seen in trade union membership figures which rose from 4 million in 1913, to 6.5 million in 1918, and 8.5 million in 1920.

The post-war economic boom, led by major change and development in certain sectors of the economy such as banking and transportation, reached its peak in the spring of 1920

with a fevered burst of speculation. This brief boom diverted capital away from the industries most in need of re-equipment and expansion to the traditional sectors of textiles and shipbuilding in which pre-war Britain had been most prosperous. There was insufficient development of new industries (electricity, cars, plastics, patent foods etc.). Inflation followed the boom, with prices rising quickly in 1919 and 1920. In March 1920 the price index stood at 323, against 100 in July 1914. Wages rose as well, but more slowly, and for many workers real wages declined compared with pre-war levels. The acute housing shortage continued long after Lloyd George's promise of 'homes fit for heroes'.

The subsequent crash preceded the long cycle of depression which lasted until World War II. However, there was a temporary recovery in 1923–4 when the French occupation of the Ruhr brought a cessation of German coal exports, and modest economic progress was made from 1924 to 1929. The realities of the long-term decline were, to some extent, concealed. Furthermore, the worst of the unemployment was confined to certain localized depressed areas, all far from London. The wealthy were still able to enjoy the privileges of the 'Glorious Twenties'.

The most obvious characteristic of the economic slump was the high level of unemployment. By March 1921 it had reached 1.5 million or 10 per cent of the working population. It remained at this figure throughout the twenties, until the crisis brought it up to almost 3 million in 1930. Unemployment was particularly concentrated in Lancashire, Tyneside, Cumberland, Scotland, and South Wales, where it hovered around 50 per cent or more.

The Government's economic management in the face of these pressures was profoundly deflationary. The reduction of both public and private expenditure led to less consumer spending power and, in turn, less demand for goods. The first Labour Government, elected in 1924 under the leadership of Ramsay MacDonald lacked an economic policy to deal with this situation. The Conservatives gained power in the hastily called General Election of November 1924 and with Stanley Baldwin praying for industrial 'peace in our time' there was a brief period of stability.

The blow which shattered this paper-thin accord, and which led to the country's only General Strike in 1926, was the

restoration of the Gold Standard. The effects of this led to coal owners announcing their intention to impose longer working hours and smaller wages on their workers. Following prolonged negotiations, the Trades Union Congress (TUC) eventually called the General Strike which began at midnight on 3rd May 1926. Within its limitations the strike was successful and there was practically no return to work before it officially ended at noon on 12th May 1926. The miners, who believed they had been 'sold out' by the TUC leadership, fought on until the winter of 1926 when starvation drove them back to work.

The collapse of the General Strike put a significant brake on the post-war militancy of the British trade unions. It brought disillusionment and a drastic drop in membership, which in 1927 fell below 5 million for the first time since 1916. Industrial relations in the late 1920s became pervaded by the ideas of cooperation and 'peace in industry'.

Despite the depression and the defeats, which meant that 1 in 10 of the entire working population was earning less than the minimum wage needed to support a family, the British working man had not entirely lost the advantages of the post-war period. Wages had almost doubled their pre-war level to

average three pounds per week, and hours had dropped from an average of about 55 to 48 per week. Although prices had kept up with wages, there was still disposable income available for 'luxuries' or for saving.

Innovation, freedom, and scepticism were the characteristics of British Society in the 1920s. The gaiety which accompanied the latter was not simply confined to the wealthier classes. Much of the employed working class was materially better off than ever before. Life in many ways was becoming easier. The growth of science, philosophy, and artistic creation was notable and internationally recognized. Mass communication expanded in a dramatic fashion. The establishment of the British Broadcasting Corporation in 1922 and its utilization of first radio and then television profoundly shaped British society. For the first time, a clearly marked 'mass culture', based on growing standardization and commercialization (and an increased American influence), began to appear. On a political level, universal suffrage was at last established when women over 21 were given the vote in 1929.

The curious anomaly which gave businessmen and university graduates two votes remained.

The General Election of 1929 saw the beginning of the second period of office for a Labour Government, albeit with the Liberals holding the balance of power. More than ever the crucial problem that faced the new Government was that of unemployment. The single minded tackling of this problem was undermined by two principal factors. Firstly, internal political dissent in the Labour and Conservative parties left both in disarray. Secondly, and of far greater importance, was the deepening world economic crisis.

The Wall Street financial crisis came at the end of October 1929, but the British economic situation did not start to become desperate until early 1931. Severe doubt about the health of the British economy led to gold reserves pouring out of the country. MacDonald's Labour Government was forced into drastic economies by the terms placed on a massive loan by the banking community. This precipitated a large reduction in unemployment benefits. This was unacceptable to several key members of the Government who subsequently resigned. The Labour Government fell from power and was replaced, also under MacDonald's leadership, by a 'National Coalition'. This government was dominated by Conservatives, and it was a Conservative set of solutions, primarily protection (through import duties), that were adopted.

By 1933 economic recovery was beginning and it continued until 1935. Unemployment fell from its peak of nearly three million in the winter of 1932–3 to below two million in July 1935. The index of production, from a base line of 100 in 1929, fell to 84 in 1931 but rose again to 93 in 1933, and to 110 in 1935. While imports were maintained, exports declined. This resulted in depressed areas in which industry was dependent on export trade. The cost-of-living fell, and those

in continuous employment were, in general, better off. The burden of recovery was carried by the unemployed, and by foreign producers whose goods Britain imported more cheaply than ever before. Favourable terms of trade probably did more to maintain the standard of living than any deliberate measures of the Government.

One of the most important factors in industrial recovery was the building boom, which included domestic houses and commercial/industrial building. Financed mainly through the help of building societies and local authorities, the new houses were cheap enough to effect a real rise in the standard of living. The rehousing of the British people was one of the most encouraging aspects of an otherwise rather bleak social scene.

On the political level, the mid-1930s was marked by a strong pacifist movement. The mainstream political parties were fatally divided about strategy towards the growing militarism of Germany, Italy and Japan. Inconsistencies and political weakness led to serious delays in recognizing this threat and to inappropriate rearmament policies. Military initiatives by the Germans in the Rhineland, Italy in North Africa, and Japan in China seemed only to further the British Government's paralysis. The Spanish Civil War also had a profound effect on British public opinion. At the end of 1936, the nation was gripped by the personal and constitutional crisis of the King, Edward VIII (the affair with Wallace Simpson).

In May 1937, after the Kings's abdication, Baldwin resigned as Prime Minister to be replaced by another conservative, Neville Chamberlain. The new Prime Minister attempted to negotiate with the German Chancellor, Adolf Hitler, and the notion of 'appeasement' became popular linguistic currency.

The decade began with the formation of one National Government in the face of an economic crisis and ended with the formation of a second in the face of military crisis. During the intervening years, the economic crisis had, in large measure, receded as the military crisis grew. Within so brief a time span, the people of Britain experienced deep economic depression and widespread distress, prolonged crises and intense anxieties, fumbling leadership and moments of national humiliation. Yet the 'devil's decade' was also a period of considerable prosperity and creative activity.

Waging World War

Britain entered a second world war against Germany on 3rd September 1939. Events in Manchuria, Abyssinia and Spain had shown just what brutalities might be expected. Overall 300,000 British combatants were killed, while the civilian population sustained losses of 60,000. The Merchant Navy lost 30,000 men. The theory and practice of total war was developed to a much fuller extent than in 1914–18. Provision for military conscription was made before the outbreak of war, and by its end five million men were in uniform. Science was of crucial importance to the war through the development of the radar, sophisticated armaments and aeroplanes, and, eventually, of atomic power.

When Winston Churchill assumed leadership of Britain and the Commonwealth in May 1940 the spirit of the 1930s died, most visibly and audibly, in the great House of Commons debate of 8th May, which resulted in Neville Chamberlain's resignation. If the saying 'cometh the hour, cometh the man' ever had a meaning, it applied to Churchill. His pugnacious self-confidence, energy, creativity, and ambition had often been out of place in his long political career up to 1940. The crisis facing Britain and the rest of the world was the stage on which he could use his talents to the full. Churchill drew strength from the breadth of the coalition which left him with no regular opposition in Parliament or in the country.

If anything had been learned from the conduct of the 1914–18 war, it was that central, clear direction of the war effort and national unity were vital ingredients to success. The enormous programme of direction and expansion of labour overseen by Churchill led to some remarkable achievements. The agricultural labour force stood at 711,000 in 1939; by 1945 it had expanded to 887,000. In 1939 the engineering and chemical industries together employed 3.1 million; in 1945 they

employed 5.2 million. At the same time the armed forces expanded from 480,000 in 1939 to 5.1 million in 1945. The role of women in the workforce was a major factor here, and this in turn contributed to the social revolution that followed the eventual end to hostilities.

The severities and sacrifices of war time had important effects on national spirit and outlook. Morale, in the services and among civilians as a whole, was always high. Whether in conscription for the services or in voluntary organizations (such as the Home Guard), the majority of ordinary citizens contributed essential services willingly. Taxes were high, rationing often severe, dislocation of life by evacuation or air raids widespread. In mid-1941, the weekly ration of certain basic foods amounted to no more than what in a comfortable pre-war household would have constituted a single helping: a shilling's worth of meat (half a pound), one ounce of cheese, four ounces of bacon or ham, eight ounces of sugar, two ounces of tea, eight ounces of fats (including not more than two ounces of butter), and two ounces of jam or marmalade.

One of the most important social consequences of the war was that it made the trade unions, in Churchill's memorable phrase, 'an estate of the realm'. This occurred as a result of the need to enlist the wholehearted support of the trade union movement in the country's war effort. Trade union leader Ernest Bevin became Minister of Labour in Churchill's War Coalition. The organized labour movement was decisive in the election of a Labour Government in 1945.

The experience of evacuation, mutual aid in air-raids, great collective sacrifice and service, and stringent rationing and controls all helped to strengthen a tide of egalitarian feeling which had been present in British society even before the war. The dream was to create a better society in which everyone could have the basic necessities of life, and where the opportunity to work and live in a decent environment would be open to all citizens. It was in the spirit of this mood that the 1942 Beveridge Report was well received, and that the welfare state was eventually established. The need for change also led to the rejection of Churchill's Conservative Government in 1945, and the formation of the reform orientated Labour Government.

'From the Cradle to the Grave'

The end of the war heralded the disintegration of the Coalition Government headed by Winston Churchill. The subsequent June 6 election brought a Labour Government, under Clement Attlee, into power.

Labour's optimistic 'Let us Face the Future' manifesto captured the mood of post-war Britain. Instead of the mass unemployment and class-consciousness of the 1930s, the Labour Government propagated a social and economic programme favouring a new more egalitarian society, in which people could be taken care of 'from the Cradle to the Grave'.

Economically, the nationalization of industry and full employment were Attlee's major concerns. In 1946, civil aviation, coal, cable and wireless, and the Bank of England were brought under public sector control; electricity and railways followed in 1947; gas in 1948; and iron and steel in 1949. Despite the rapid and major changes in Britain's economy, only 20 per cent of industry was nationalized during this period, employing approximately 2.5 million people.

Between 1946–51, Britain experienced above average rates of growth in production in certain sectors. Gas, electricity, and water rose by 36 per cent; transport and commerce by 23 per cent; and other manufacturing by 55.7 per cent; while steel production by the end of the 1940s was 60 per cent higher than its pre-war level.

Labour's social reforms were also impressive. Through a series of revolutionizing acts Labour laid the foundation of the Welfare State. The National Insurance Act (1946) developed ideas introduced in the Beveridge Report of 1942; the National Health Service Act proposed a system which would provide medical care for all through state-funded hospitals; and the Housing Acts of 1946 and 1949 promoted the con-

struction of council houses (from 1945-51 approximately 1 million houses were built).

Against this background of social reform, post-war Britain was suffering from a severe 'dollar gap', which had existed in the 1930s but increased drastically during the war. This eventually led to the establishment of the Organization for European Economic Cooperation (OEEC) which administered US financial aid to Europe. The force of British exports and the maintenance of full employment gradually helped to stabilize the economy - however, the pound was devalued in 1949, and fell from four dollars and three cents to two dollars and eighty cents. Similarly, Dalton and Cripps's restrictive financial policies which used high direct taxation, full employment, and a policy of austerity as tools to aid economic recovery worked well. The 1947 Supplies and Services Bill, although highly unpopular, rationed main foodstuffs, including potatoes and bread for the first time. Prices were rigidly controlled and wages increased at a slower rate than pre-war

By the end of the 1940s the Balance of Payments problem seemed to be stabilizing, exports had risen from 1946 by approximately 11.9 per cent, industrial production had increased by 5.75 per cent, and total output had increased by 2.3 per cent per annum. Despite this Labour's popularity was declining – and the election of February 1950 returned them to power by a small majority.

Internationally, Britain's Empire was crumbling. In 1947 India achieved independence and the new country of Pakistan was created. Ceylon and Burma also detached themselves from the Empire in the same year. In Africa the separatist movement started to grow in importance. In general, the time when Britain had influenced international affairs had long passed, instead the US and USSR became the most important political and economic forces in world affairs.

From 1945-49, Britain experienced a period of great change. Aided by Labour's egalitarian policies, the nation began to recover from the social and financial mayhem caused by World War II. Instead of looking back to mass unemployment, recession, and social inequality, Britain began to look forward with great optimism to a more stable, less class-conscious society.

By the end of the 1940s Britain appeared to be experiencing recovery. Despite this Labour popularity was in decline, and in 1951, the Conservative Party, under Winston Churchill, returned to power.

The early years of the 1950s were overshadowed by death and illness among the nation's leaders. In 1952, George VI died, and was succeeded by his young daughter, Elizabeth II. Churchill himself had a serious stroke in 1953, and Anthony Eden, who became acting Prime Minister, also became ill in 1953. Finally, in 1955, Churchill retired, leaving his protegé, Eden, to take his place as Prime Minister.

The Britain Eden inherited was in good shape, economically and financially. Unemployment was low, the Balance of Payments was stable, and housing, the bane of the Labour administration, was finally under control, due to the effective policies of Harold Macmillan, Minister of Housing, 1951–54.

Eden promoted private property ownership and partnership in industry (between management and workers). This fitted in well with the progressively more democratic stance that society was taking. Since 1947, Britain's middle-range income group had been the fastest growing. The lower-middle class and the high-earning working class groups had risen from 75 per cent in 1947 to 81 per cent of the total, in 1955.

Saving and investment was also rising – and the building and rearmament programmes (the latter triggered by the Korean War, 1950-53) had led to a boom.

However, in the international arena, Britain was suffering. In 1956, British troops were sent to prevent a Mau uprising in Kenya. This was quickly overshadowed by the Suez Crisis with Egypt. Both Britain and the USA had offered Egypt substantial funding to build the Aswan High Dam, however, the USA quickly withdrew its offer, and Britain followed. Consequently, Egypt announced the nationalization of the Suez Canal Company, a move that breached several international agreements. The ensuing crisis divided the British government, and caused several ministers to resign. Finally Eden himself resigned in January 1957, and Macmillan was asked to form a new Government.

Towards the end of the 1950s Conservative support began to wane, in part because of the Suez Crisis, in part because of policies that tried to promote expansion while reducing inflation. The 'credit squeeze' of 1959 proved one such highly unpopular policy.

For the most part the 1950s was the period of the 'affluent' society which had become used to full employment, mass consumption, economic growth, and rich rewards. Mass consumerism made Macmillan's promises that society had 'never had it so good' and the self-orienting 'I'm alright Jack' more attractive than ever before. Gone was the interest in the Welfare State, and a more egalitarian society seen in the 1940s – self interest and wealth were motivating forces. As the rich became richer, minority groups, such as the elderly and the sick, suffered. It seemed that the competitive British society of the 1950s no longer had room for its waifs and strays.

The changes that occurred in Britain during the 1960s can to some extent be seen as the effect of international influence on the nation.

Britain's population at the beginning of the Sixties exceeded the 50 million mark. A high level of immigration from Commonwealth countries, including the West Indies, India, and Pakistan, had added significantly to the population. From 1952–61, West Indian immigration reached 50,000 per annum. This was controlled to some degree by the much criticized Commonwealth Immigration Act (1962) which restricted immigration to people who had a guaranteed job or a special skill to give to the economy. This act was seen unofficially as introducing the 'colour bar'.

The population was enjoying a higher standard of living than it had done in many years, and while mortality rates were decreasing, birth rates were increasing. However, following the increase in immigration, there had been a rise in neofascist activity, and some politicians feared that if unemployment or inflation increased the minority foreign groups might be blamed.

In fact Britain's Balance of Payments was again suffering. Strong competition from abroad had reduced its export market drastically. Rapid economic growth and moderately stable prices were now replaced by a period of much slower growth and rising prices which exacerbated the Balance of Payments problem further.

Macmillan's position also started to disintegrate. Firstly, the French President de Gaulle blocked Britain's entry into the

European Common Market (EEC), and then political scandal rocked the Conservative Party. The Profumo Affair, which involved the Secretary of State for War, John Profumo, and a prostitute who was linked with an attaché to the Soviet Embassy, brought demands for Macmillan's resignation. In the end ill health forced the Prime Minister to stand down in October 1963. He was succeeded by Sir Alec Douglas-Home, the former Foreign Secretary.

Douglas-Home did not enjoy much public support. His aristocratic background alienated the working class; he did not come across well on television (this was the beginning of the political manipulation of the media); and his party was divided. His cabinet was, however, responsible for bringing down both inflation and unemployment, and for helping to promote Britain's export industry. Despite this in the general election held in 1964, Labour won, and Harold Wilson became Prime Minister.

The Labour Government tried to learn from the Conservative mistakes which from necessity had used a restrictive-expansionary Stop-Go economic policy. Labour tried to evolve an effective and realistic policy which would lead to economic growth.

Devaluation seemed to be the best way to set the economy back on course, but the Wilson administration was unwilling to do this. Instead it embarked on a series of unpopular policies including the Selective Employment Tax which imposed a pay-roll tax on workers in the service sector.

GDP did, however, rise by 7.7 per cent between 1967–70, but private consumption only increased by 5.4 per cent and public consumption by less than 1 per cent. Exports rose by 27 per cent compared with a 17 per cent increase in imports. By 1970 the Balance of Payments surplus was over £735 million on the current account – the Wilson administration bequeathed its successors one of the highest Balance of Payments surpluses this century. Among its successes, however, was its development of regional policy and its use of investment grants to improve Britain's infra-structure. It also increased public spending in education, health, and social security.

Against this political and economic background Britain's population was enjoying the benefits of greater sexual and intellectual freedom. Influenced by events taking place across

the world in the USA, a cultural explosion took place in music, and the arts. For Britain the 1960s was a period of great change and social and economic development.

In 1970 unemployment was at its highest level in years, inflation was raging out of control, and economic growth was at its lowest level since 1964. The violence in Northern Ireland had exploded in 1969, and British troops had been placed on the streets of Belfast.

Edward Heath's Conservative Government came to power in June 1970 amid general chaos. One of the first measures adopted to deal with the chronic unemployment was the 'lame-duck' policy of investing public money in redundant industries, such as shipbuilding. While this alleviated the employment situation in the short term, creating jobs in seemingly uncompetitive areas of the economy, it also helped to increase public expenditure by 8 per cent between 1970–72, and subsequently exacerbated the rising level of inflation. Attempts were made to introduce restrictive wage policies to help control inflation. One of the results of these policies was the first coal strike since the 1926 General Strike, and subsequent wage increases for the industry of more than 30 per

cent, in comparison to the 7.5 originally proposed by the National Coal Board.

Rapid world commodity prices caused an even worse Balance of Payments crisis than anticipated, and the outbreak of the Yom Kippur War between Israel and the Arab States caused oil prices to quadruple in 1973. Although the Chancellor of the Exchequer tried to deal with the situation with massive reductions in public expenditure and tighter credit restrictions the ensuing Conservative defeat in the General Election of 1974 hardly came as a surprise.

The Wilson administration of 1974-79 did not fare much

The Public Sector Borrowing Requirement (PSBR) increased by 75 per cent between 1975–77, and the value of the pound decreased radically which led the Government to go to the International Monetary Fund (IMF) for monetary aid.

Inflation continued to increase at a higher rate than Britain's European competitors, although it fell into single figures (8.2 per cent) in 1978 for the first time in five years. Unemployment, however, reached a peak of 1.6 million in 1977.

Between 1970–79 Britain had four different Prime Ministers and experienced several different types of monetary policy. It suffered from chronic unemployment and high inflation, and lagged behind its export competitors in technology and business practices. Prices doubled and unemployment tripled. The Labour Government lost public support and sympathy, and instead, in the election of 1979, Britain elected its first woman Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher.

Society versus Economy: The Thatcher Years

PRIME MINISTER
Margaret Thatcher (Conservative), May 1979-November 1990

When Margaret Thatcher became Britain's first female Prime Minister in 1979, it signalled the winds of change for the nation – what followed were in essence the hardest and possibly the most successful years for the economy. A 'monetarist' economist, Thatcher appointed Geoffrey Howe to the Exchequer to carry out policies which effectively set unemployment against inflation.

In 1980, unemployment reached 1.3 million for the first time since 1978, and inflation raged at 27.8 per cent. The Thatcher administration employed restrictive policies to decrease public expenditure, most notably by denationalizing several public owned industries and cutting back on social security expenditure. It also promoted private ownership and entrepreneurship. Thatcher's society was a competitive one in which the rich and often the young could become extremely wealthy

In 1982, after a decline in popularity, and just before a General Election, Thatcher involved Britain in the Falklands War against Argentina from 2 April to 14/15 June 1982, this with the loss of over 1000 lives. The Conservative Party was subsequently re-elected.

As unemployment increased, and inner-city poverty grew rapidly, racial tensions were raised, culminating in several riots in the early 1980s; support for the National Front (the neo-fascist movement) also rose.

The Thatcher administration passed several restrictive laws to limit Trade Union activity – gone were the days when the TUC could grind the nation to a halt with its strike activity. The 1980s also saw a rise in the inequalities between different regions in Britain. The North of England, Scotland, Wales, and parts of Northern Ireland became the poorest areas in Britain, with the highest levels of unemployment.

The Conservative Party promoted new business activity, creating private enterprise grants, and directing large amounts of funding to technical and scientific education in the hope that Britain would once more become a competitive nation.

As the 1980s progressed the Thatcher administration became increasingly unpopular. The proposed dismantling of the Welfare State and the National Health Service provoked much public reaction. However, the Community Charge or 'Poll Tax', a per capita tax introduced firstly in Scotland, and then in the rest of the country, resulted in violent protest and riots. The tax was regressive and fell most heavily on the poor, young, and infirm.

By the end of the 1980s, Britain was divided between the very poor and the very rich. Splits within the Conservative Cabinet over European issues and a crisis in the Government finally resulted in Margaret Thatcher's resignation in 1990.

After Thatcher's fall from grace and her subsequent resignation in 1990, the former Chancellor of the Exchequer John Major became Prime Minister. Major epitomized for much of the population proof that a 'working-class boy' could 'make good'.

Major's years in power have been centred around the severe recession that Britain has experienced since the late 1980s. Britain's economy suffered greatly from 1990 to 1993, as did the economies of western Europe generally. Chronic unemployment, a high rate of house repossession, cuts in social security benefits and the National Health Service remain dominant issues. The number of homeless people living on the streets, and the number of people living below the poverty line have increased as the gap between rich and poor has continued to grow.

Despite a period of political intrigues and scandals, Major won the 1992 election. Since then the Labour Party, which for most of the 1980s was struggling to define changes in its policies and therefore presented a relatively weak opposition, has gained strength and popularity. Recent reshuffles and redirections in policy have made it a much more formidable adversary. The death of John Smith led to the election of Tony Blair as the leader of the Labour Party.

At the same time, the government has brought about a reduction in, and stabilization of, inflation. Interest rates have also

been radically reduced, due in large part to Britain's withdrawal from the European Exchange Rate Mechanism. After this withdrawal, the exchange rate of the pound against the strong European currencies slipped dramatically, raising the price of imports and travel abroad, but encouraging exports. Public sector pay increases have also been kept low, relatively closely inline with inflation, during this period. However, the 'green shoots of recovery' which the government repeatedly claimed to be emerging took time to detect.

In recent years the Conservatives have launched a 'Back to Basics' campaign which advocates community/family care as opposed to the system of government safety-nets created by the Welfare State. Part of this campaign has been an attack on the general level of morality including criticism by some against single mothers. The campaign has been viewed with a good deal of irony as a spate of scandals has caused a number of leading Conservatives to resign.

The rise of neo-nationalism as personified in the British National Party (BNP), and other similar factions around the world, has raised the profile of racialism and intolerance in general. The celebration of democracy in Eastern Europe has been followed by uncertainties and tensions in the area. Ethnic divisions have sparked off civil war in the former Yugoslavia.

In Britain the 'Poll Tax' was replaced by the Council Tax in April 1993, loosely based on the old Rates system. The most vociferous objectors were pensioners. Despite signs of economic recovery, consumer confidence has remained shaky. Around a million home owners are reported to be caught in the negative equity trap; and job insecurity is another factor which has stifled growth.
