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TEXTILE MACHINERY AND ACCESSORIES TRADE

THIS REPORT on the Textile Machinery and Accessories Trade relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of spinning, winding, weaving, knitting, printing, dyeing, etc. machinery for use in the textile industries, and accessories such as bobbins, combs, jacquard cards, reeds, rollers, shuttles and spindles.

This trade corresponds to minimum list heading 56 in the Standard Industrial Classification.
Establishments in this trade in Northern Ireland were, for 1935, included in the Mechanical Engineering (General) Trade (Volume 4, Trade I).

IMPORTANT NOTES and definitions appear on the inside of the back cover of this report. In interpreting the data in the following tables, it is essential to bear these in mind.
