C Biscuit	152	The slaughtering of animals in abattoirs and wholesale slaughterhouses for human consumption.	
D Wholesale Slaughtering	153 (1)	Pigs slaughtered by curers for bacon are not included.  The slaughterhouses are controlled by the Ministry of Food. The information given relates to livestock purchased by the Ministry of Food, subsequently slaughtered and sold as meat (including offal) for human consumption, hides, skins and gut. No operatives are employed by the Ministry of Food, killing being done on behalf of the Ministry by contractors at fixed payments. (See also note (c) to Table 1).  The total value of sales is computed at approved wholesale prices. Purchases of materials relate to the cost of live animals, direct purchase expenses at collecting centres and transport expenses from centres to slaughterhouses. Stocks of finished goods relate to meat and edible offal valued at approved wholesale prices, and cattle, calf and sheep skins. Stocks of materials relate to live animals held. "Payment for work done on materials given out" is for the cost of slaughtering only	8/4

Milk bottling by retailers who do not maintain a central bottling or pasteurizing depot is excluded.  For the 1950 census this trade in Great Britain has been divided into three parts. (a) Establishments engaged wholly or mainly in sterilizing (pasteurizing), cooling and bottling whole milk, and also engaged in merchanting or retailing, made returns for 1950, in the census of distribution only. (b) Establishments engaged in these activities but which sold no merchanted goods nor undertook retailing were only asked to give the limited information required from firms in "overlap" trades in the 1950 census of production. (c) Establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of milk products gave the full particulars required for the 1950 census of production and the details collected are shown in Tables 1, 2 and 3 of this Report.
