THIS REPORT on the Woollen and Worsted Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or ainly in the sorting, blending, scouring and carbonising of wool and other animal hair, the recover of wool from rags, and all intermediate processes up to and including the weaving of woollen and worsted fabrics, the manufacture of wool felt, hair cloth, and the manufacture of wool blanikets, etc The spinning of rayon, nylon, etc., staple fibre by woollen and worsted spinners is included.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 112 in the Standard Industrial Classifioation.
