Introductory

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BOOT AND SHOE TRADE
THIS REPORT on the Boot and Shoe Trade relates to establish ments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of boots and shoes (other than of rubber), slippers and clogs and their parts
and accessories (except rubber soles and heels, wooden heels and lasts, and clog blocks and irons), and the repair of boots, shoes and clogs for the trade.

This trade corresponds to minimum list headings 148 and 149 in the Standard Industrial Classification.

The treatment of repairers differed in the three years. For 1948, returns were not obtained from firms repairing direct for the general public or from those that undertook repairs in the same establishment as that used primarily for retailing or wholesaling purchased goods. A large number of firms exclude in 1948 were included in 1935. Repairing firms were not figures for 1935 as well as the total for manufacturers and repairers.

Establishments in this trade in Northern Ireland are excluded in 1948. Owing to the risk of disclosure of information elating
