## THE LACE TRADE

 INTRODUCTORYThis trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture or finishing of lace and lace goods.

Firms whose operations were confined to the finishing processes (lace warehouses) were excluded from the Import Duties Act Inquiries for I934 and I933 but included in the Census of Production for each of the years 1935, I930 and 1924. For comparison with the results of the Inquiries for 1934 and I933, particulars inclusive of lace warehouses are also shown in Table I A for the censal years 1935 and 1930.

In 1924 the value of the gross output of the small firms making returns was 6.7 per cent. of the total. The items principally affected were cotton lace and articles thereof (made on machines other than net or curtain machines)-13 per cent., and the output of lace and lace goods finished at lace warehouses- 12 per cent.

## Table V.-Output of principal products

In order to ascertain the output of finished lace, net, and articles thereof in 1935, firms manufacturing lace and finishing it in the same works and firms buying brown lace and net and articles thereof (Lace warehouses) and either finishing them or giving them out to be finished, gave particulars of their output in the finished state. In I934 firms that carried out both the manufacturing and finishing of lace and net were required to show the value of each kind of product in the unfinished form and to state, in one sum, the value added by the finishing processes carried out in their own works. The values shown for individual headings in this table are accordingly not on the same basis, but this change does not affect such quantitative comparisons as are possible of the output of manufacturers in 1934 and I935 (see also introductory paragraph page 207).
