## THE LEATHER GOODS TRADE

## INTRODUCTORY

This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of travelling bags, trunks, saddlery, harness and other leather goods.

The figures for 1934 and 1933 are deficient in relation to those for other years by reason of the omission of certain firms, particulars of whose output in 1935 are given in a footnote to Table V. The value of the gross output of those firms in 1935 was $£ 144,000$, the net output $£ 69,000$ and the number of persons employed 529 .

In the absence of information regarding quantities of goods produced in 1934 and of goods exported and imported in 1935 and 1934, Table VI is omitted.
