TEXTILE TRADES

THE ROPE, TWINE AND NET TRADE

INTRODUCTORY

This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of ropes, cordage, twine and nets of hemp, cotton, jute, etc.

Occupiers of workshops were not required to furnish returns in connection with the Import Duties Act Inquiries of 1934 and 1933. The omission of such particulars does not affect seriously the comparability of the figures given in this report. The value of the gross output of these firms in 1935 was $\pounds 98,000$, the net output $\pounds 45,000$ and the number of persons employed 556.
