1-A	A Asbestos	129 (1) and 199 (3) (part)	The spinning and weaving of asbestos and the manufacture of engine and boiler packing, brake and clutch linings, etc.	7/2
1-B	B Flock and Rag	129 (2)	The manufacture of flocks for bedding and upholstery, and the sorting, cleaning, etc., of textile waste and rags	7/2
1-C	C Hair, Fibre and Kindred Trades	129 (3) and 199 (3) (part)	The manufacture of coir mats and matting, the processing of animal hair and the manufacture of hair cloth, hair felt, and upholstery padding of hair or fibre, the cleaning and dressing of kapok and vegetable down and the purifying and dressing of feathers or down. Normally these trades are independent of each other, but since they are small they are grouped together. The cleaning and dressing of fibres and bristles is excluded, being covered by the report on the Brushes and Brooms trade. 1-D	D Leather (Tanning and Dressing)	130 (1)	The curing, degreasing, tanning, dyeing, etc., of all types of hides and skins and the making of leather machinery belting and leather laces. Net output in 1948 includes an increase in the value of stocks of raw hides, process goods and finished goods held by tanners on January 1, 1948, but purchased before that date. This increase in value is due to the removal of the leather subsidy from January 1, 1948, and amounts to about £7½ million, the greater proportion of which would be realised in 1948. Of that figure about £6 million had to be dealt with in accordance with the Leather Charges (Nos. 1 to 3) Orders	7/3
1-E	E Fellmongery	130 (2)	The removal of wool from sheep and lamb skins and the making of sheepskin mats and rugs	7/4
1-F	F Leather Goods	131	The manufacture of trunks, suitcases, handbags, pocket books, belts, straps, harness, saddlery and other goods (except clothing) of leather and leather substitutes... ..	7/4
1-G	G Fur	132	The sorting, dressing and dyeing of furs, and the manufacture of fur apparel, fur muffs, fur trimmings, fur mats and rugs and hatters' fur	7/5
1-H	H Tailoring, Dressmaking, etc.	140, 141, 142, 147 (1) and 147 (5)	The manufacture of made-up clothing including corsets, handkerchiefs, scarves, ties, belts and braces, suspenders, wigs, artificial flowers, feather ornaments, etc. Particulars available in respect of H.M. 1-K	K Umbrella and Walking Stick	147 (4) and 99 (8) (part)	The manufacture of umbrellas, sunshades and walking sticks, and the repairing and recovering of umbrellas and sunshades if done for the trade but not if done directly for the public	7/7
1-L	L Boot and Shoe	148 and 149	The manufacture of boots and shoes (other than of rubber), slippers and clogs and their parts and accessories (except rubber soles and heels, wooden heels and lasts, and clog blocks and irons), and the repair of boots, shoes and clogs for the trade	7/7
