- 1. In the contents listings, pagination for January 1993 (pp 645-696) is shown before the February to December listings (pp 1-564).
- 2. In addition to the 1993 features listing, a chronological record of all features from January 1990 to December 1992 is included.
- For the first time, a separate alphabetical subject listing of all parliamentary questions noted in the pages of Employment Gazette for 1993 is included. References to each separate parliamentary question can also be found in the main body of the index under the appropriate subject heading.
- 4. Each issue of *Employment Gazette* includes a yellow section: the LFS Help-Line. All items in the Help-Line have been separately included by subject in the main body of the index. From January to April inclusive, the page numbers for the Help-Line section form part of the general *Employment Gazette* pagination, but in May this changes to separate numbering (L1-L4) and from June to December this section is denoted by the letters LFS. All such references from May to December, therefore, are denoted by L or LFS followed by the specific page number and the month.
- 5. The May issue of *Employment Gazette* included a facsimile of the May 1893 issue of *Labour Gazette*. This has been noted in the main index, but its contents have not been indexed.

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
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
