THIS REPORT on the Umbrella and Walking Stick industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of umbrellas, sunshades, and walking sticks, and in the repairing and re-covering of umbrellas and sunshades if done for the trade but not if done directly for the public.

Industrial Classif fication: Establishments are classif-
ied to industries according to the nature of their outied to industries according to the nature of their out-
put and. as far as possible. in conformity with the
Standard Industrial Ciasifiction are identified as the principal products of individual

being of asinilar nature or oommonly asociated in pro-

followed is that an ostabishent is clasifified to an
industry if its output of the principal products of that ndertry if its outpot of the principal products of that
