24 Coke ovens and manufactured fuel

This Report on the Coke Ovens and Manufactured Fuel Industry relates to Coke Ovens (other than those forming part of the gas industry) producing hard coke and associated by-products, and establishments producing low temperature coke and other manufactured solid fuels whether carbonised or not. Coke ovens forming part of the gas industry are included in the Report on the Gas Industry (Part 152).

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 261 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 census.

The industry corresponds to the Coke Ovens and Manufactured Fuel Industry (Part 22) in the Reports on the last detailed Census of Production for 1963 except that creosote/pitch mixtures (whether or not for use as fuel) were shown in the Report on General Chemicals (Part 27).

Throughout this Report, the figures given for 1963 have been reclassified, as far as possible, according to the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) so that data for 1963 and 1968 are on the same industrial basis. However the reclassification of small firms, which provided limited information only, has been arbitrary.

There were no larger establishments in this industry in Northern Ireland in 1963 or 1968.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv).
