## The Report on the Census of Production for 1954

TA ILORING, DRESSMAKING, ETC.
THIS REPCRT on the Tailoring, Dressmaking, etc. Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of made-up clothing, including corsets, handkerchiefs, scarves, ties, belts garments from knitted fabric but do not operate knitting machines are included. garments from knitted fabric but do not operate knitting machines are included.

This industry includes $a$ number of establishments engaged wholly or partly in making-up clothing on commission from materials supplied by other firms. While some of the firms giving out the work are themselves engaged in manufacturing and report their total sales in the census, not all are. The figures
for sales of different garments shown in Table 5 of the report exclude the sales by principals outside the scope of the census, but the amount received by commission makers-up working for those principals is scope of the census, but the amount received by commission makers-up working for thase principals is
included in Table 5 against the headings for work done. It is estimated that the selling value of clothing made up for principals not included in the census might be between $£ 40$ million and $£ 50$ million

For larger establishments that reported total make of most garments as well as sales, the total quantities made (including those made on commission) are shown in Table 8. These figures are in many cases considerably higher than the quantities sold reported in Table 5
(1) minimum list headings $140,141,142,147(1), 147(3)$ and $147(5)$ in the Standard Industrial Classification.

The estimates for the industry as a whole given in
Table 1 are normally obtained by increasing the othe tion as total employment. Gross output (production) is the total value of goods
made and other nork done euring the year: it is obtained by adjusting the value of sales and work done during
the yaar for changes in the value of stocks of products on hand for sale and work in progress.
Net output is the amount left after deducting from the
value of qrosz out put the aqgregte of of the cost of mat-
erials and fuel used the amount paid for work erials and fuel ansed. the amount paiid for work int of matand, for 1951 and 1954, any transport payments made.
This represents the value added to materials by the pro-
cess of production, and constitutes the fund from which mates. solaries. rents, rates and taxes. advertising and
other selling expenses and all other iniliar charges
have to be met, as well as depreciation and profits. Sales means sales during the year of goods made in the
establishment covered by the return or made on commission for it, whether produced in the year or not. The
value of salee is the net selling value. i.e. the
amount charged to customers. whether on an ex-works or
 tax. etc. For qoods charged on a delivered basis to to
cuatomers overseas. firms were required to give the
