Introductory.*

The tables on pages 444 and 445 are based on returns received from firms in Great Britain whose business in 1924 consisted wholly or mainly in the developing and printing of films for cinematograph purposes. This trade was included within the scope of the Census of Production for the first time in 1924 and comparative figures are, therefore, not available for earlier years. The number of separate returns received was 27. Five firms to which schedules were sent did not furnish returns, but it is estimated that they did not employ more than 20 persons in all and that their total net output did not exceed $f_{6,000}$.

MISCELLANEOUS TRADES.

Production.

Detailed information regarding the output of the Film Printing Trade will be found in Table II on page 444.

Amount of output.—The following table shows the value and the quantity of the chief classes of cinematograph films printed and developed in 1924, distinguishing between the output of such goods returned on schedules for the Film Printing Trade and that returned on schedules for other trades.

In addition to the output shewn above the firms that made their returns on schedules for the Film Printing Trade reported that they received the sum of $f_{21,000}$ for negative developing, celluloid recovery and other work.

The output of this trade is substantially free from duplication.

Cost of materials.—The cost of materials used by firms that made their returns on schedules for the Film Printing Trade was returned as <u>f</u>504,000 in 1924.

Net output.—The net output in 1924 of the firms that made their returns on schedules for the Film Printing Trade (whose gross output was valued at $\pounds 686,000$) was $\pounds 182,000$, that sum representing the total amount by which the value, as delivered, of the aggregate output exceeded the cost, as purchased, of the materials used.

The net output per head of persons employed in the censal year 1924 was £289.

Exports and imports.—The retained imports of exposed positive films (whether developed or not) in 1924 amounted to 32,052,000 linear feet and the exports to 23,913,000 linear feet.

Employment.

The detailed information relating to employment in 1924 is summarised in Table III on page 445. The following table shows the average numbers employed in that year; the average numbers of operatives of each sex have been divided between the two age-groups in the proportions shown by the data relating to the week ended 18th October.

The numbers of operatives recorded month by month in 1924 fell from 23 above the average, in January, to 20 below the average, in December (see Table IIIB, page 445).

Mechanical Power.

No prime movers or electric generators were recorded in the Film Printing Trade in 1924. The total capacity of electric motors was returned as 267 horse-power, all driven by purchased electricity. Of this total, motors with a capacity of 9 horse-power were reported as being in reserve or idle.
