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THE GLOVE TRADE.

Note.—For information regarding the scope of the Census, instructions given to firms for making returns, and definitions of the terms used in this report, reference should be made to the Introductory Notes on pages v to xviii.

Introductory.

This trade comprises firms that were engaged wholly or mainly in the manufacture of leather gloves and fabric gloves.

The following table shows the main results of the Censuses of 1930 and 1924 in respect of firms in Great Britain that employed an average of more than 10 persons, the figures for 1924 including particulars relating to one firm in Scotland. No production was recorded for Scotland in 1930, and the summary table (I) and the tables showing details of power equipment (IV) and consumption of fuel (V) are not appended to this report. The whole of this information is available in the tables given in the report itself. No output of gloves was returned in either year for Northern Ireland.

Knitted gloves of wool and other textile materials (other than fabric gloves) are dealt with in the report on the Hosiery Trade (see page 169).

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Deficiencies in 1930 aggregates.—The aggregate number of persons employed in 1930 by firms that stated that they employed not more than ten persons on the average was 311, the corresponding figure for 1924 being 208. A Safeguarding of Industries duty was imposed on imported fabric gloves and gloves of leather and fur on December 22nd, 1925, and continued in operation until December 21st, 1930, when the duty expired. During 1930, imported gloves of natural and artificial silk were subject to the Customs duties on silk manufactures imposed by the Finance Act of 1925. The figures for imports and exports exclude gloves sent by parcel post, except as regards imports during 1930 for the period during which duty was payable.

Other products.—In addition to the output shown in the table of principal products on page 439, the following goods were produced in 1930 and 1924 by firms that made their returns on schedules for the Glove Trade. These goods are dealt with in the reports on those trades in which the principal output was recorded.
