149 Plastics products

This Report on the Plastics Products Industry relates to establishments engaged wholly or mainly in manufacturing plastics goods and components, including resin bonded fibreglass goods, not reported elsewhere, plastics building materials, rain water goods, etc and plastics packaging (other than bags of transparent regenerated cellulose film). Covered mattresses, etc, of plastics foam, plastics belting, hose and fitments, plastics floor coverings, plastics brushes, plastics toys, games and sports requisites, plastics buttons, plastics products used as leather substitutes and fibreglass boats are all excluded. The coating of metal with plastics (including dip coating of pipes, wires etc) is also excluded.

This industry corresponds to minimum list heading 496 in the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) which has been used for the first time as a basis of classification in the 1968 Census.

The industry corresponds to the Plastics Moulding and Fabricating Industry (Part 124) in the Reports on the last detailed Census of Production for 1963 except that covered mattresses, bolsters, pillows and cushions of plastics foam are now included in the Bedding and Soft Furnishings Industry (Part 133), plastics buttons in the Miscellaneous Manufacturing Industries (Part 150), small cases of plastics in the Leather Goods Industry (Part 114), plastics belting, hose and fitments and the plastics coating of metal (including dip coatings of pipes, wires etc) in the Rubber Industry (Part 144). Dental goods of plastics (including artificial teeth, etc), artificial limbs and appliances of plastics (other than surgical boots) which were previously included in the Scientific, Surgical and Photographic Instruments, etc Industry (Part 53) are now included in this industry.

Throughout this Report the figures given for 1963 have been reclassified, as far as possible according to the Standard Industrial Classification (Revised 1968) so that data for 1963 and 1968 are on the same industrial basis. However the reclassification of small firms, which provided limited information only, has been arbitrary.

TREATMENT OF FABRICS BACKED WITH PLASTIC FOAM AND FABRIC TO FABRIC BONDED MATERIALS

Sales of fabric backed with plastic foam and fabric to fabric bonded materials are shown as principal products of the same industry as the main fabric rather than that of the material used for the backing, bonding or lining. Thus where the main fabric is cotton, linen or man-made fibres, woollen or worsted, or knitted fabric the sales are shown in the Table 5 of the Reports on the Weaving of Cotton, Linen and Man-made Fibres (Part 100), Woollen and Worsted (Part 101) and Hosiery and Other Knitted Goods (Part 104) respectively. Total sales of all fabric backed with foam and fabric bonded materials, reported in the census together with those reported by textile converters in a separate inquiry, are brought together in a supplement to Table 5 in the Report on the Weaving of Cotton, Linen and Man-made Fibres Industry (Part 100).

Sales of fabric backed with plastic foam and fabric to fabric bonded materials were not taken into account in classifying returns to the three textile industries in which they are shown. Where fabrics were foam backed or bonded on commission, returns reporting doing this work were classified to the Textile Finishing Industry (Part 110).

METHOD OF CLASSIFICATION

The classification of returns to this industry followed the standard procedure except for the special treatment of fabric backed with plastic foam and fabric to fabric bonded materials referred to above. The classification of returns to sub-divisions of the industry followed the standard procedure.

In interpreting the data in the tables it is essential to bear in mind the notes and definitions which appear on pages (i) to (iv).
