It is due to those who knowing my wife and holding her in deserved esteem or affection, many of whom are yet unacquainted with her recent illness, that I should send this.

My wife after treatment at home, and after the most careful examination by Specialists, on their advice entered the Nursing Home attached to the Bolingbroke Hospital, Wandsworth Common, on Saturday, September 10th.

On the following Monday an operation was performed, which disclosed a cancerous growth in the breast, and the right breast was removed.

Jessie made most favourable progress during the first two weeks, and it was expected that she would be able to return home at the end of the third week, but, during the third week, septic trouble developed and thereafter her condition was serious, one day better, one day worse.

We never abandoned hope, not to the moment of her death, and throughout her illness Jessie shewed a courage, cheerful patience and gentleness that won the admiration and affection of the strangers who tended her day and night with the greatest care and sought with all their power to save her life.

Heart failure was most feared, the strain upon it and the bodily weakness became more and more severe; but still we hoped and were encouraged by fresh efforts.

On Thursday, October 20th, we all thought Jessie was a little stronger, but on the night of that day, after a fit of coughing, she expired, without pain, without foreknowledge, without a cry, almost instantly, and her spirit passed like

". . . . . . . . . . . . the breath

Of the night-wind, down the vast edges drear

And naked shingles of the world."

Her face,

"So beautiful and dreadful in its calm Deathstill, Lifesweet, with folded palms she lay."

Now she lies in a grave with her only boy and with her father.

We have been married for fifteen years, and nothing in all these years has dimmed her fragrant sweetness, her radiant serenity and beautiful gentleness. Her's was a nature tuned to the harmony of that new time of which we Socialists dream—when the natural, wholesome attributes of men and women, growing untrammelled by greed or envy of sordid gain—"which sows the human heart with tares"—shall flower and sweeten life and make glorious the earth.

Thinking of what my wife's companionship was and is to me, I can hereafter "hush and bless myself with silence."

So, for you, these ineffective, unavailing words and these faint, fair shadows for remembrance.
