



The Bishop of Guildford preached at Farnham Parish Church on Sunday morning, the occasion of the official armstice Levrice. Thenkers of the urban District Council & other public bodies attended.

In his address the Bishop referred to the sense of relief & freedom which come with the armotice a the hope that the war had been one to end war. "I wonder he proceeded "how much of that hope is left among us now.

I hope I am not a pessimist but it does seem to me as if as the years have gone by we have got farther & farther away from that great Hope. Only jesterday some one said to me "I hope you are not foring to say anything in favour of the Leafue of nations

I don't think anybody would have said that at the beginning of the Peace that reigned after the War. and jet we must be aware of the fact that War now means something which it has never meant before.

Ofter a reference to the new honors of another war or greig said " I think we are standing on a sort of plateau with frest dangers all around us + it does seem to me that one of the most disappointing aspects is that the manifestation of the Lons of God has not taken place.

He thought perhaps the most remarkable discourse or "statement about the human Race & the most knofound & the most true was that of It Paul in the 8th. Chopter of Romans. We have been waiting 1.900 years & we did not see any manifestation of the Consof God which would deliver us from the bondage of corruption, from the pain and P. T. O. to page 2

and

massacre & boutalety & erwelly which escribed. What would ST Paul Lay if he could have known, 1900 jears after he wrote this that weary Jears of war, like the late war should have taken place & that another war, infinitely worse - I won't say very lekely, but not impossible in a very short time?

It seems as if the whole Gospel of & Paul was like a pricked bladder a very beautiful dream, quite an esetraordinarily beautiful dream. but a dream which, when one awakes, Seems to be a futile and esetraordinary misuse of the human mind.

What are we to say? I think first of all we have got to bear in mind that the prolongation of time is one of the most emple of all modern discoveries. When I was born a brought up we felt quite confident that the World had started in 4004 B.C. I would be ended before very long.

We now know that the world we live in has excisted for mellions of years, that human beings have been on this couth hundreds of thousands of years rive see how profound a real is the Jewish philosophy which teaches us that a thousand years in Gods sight are but as one day.

I have learnt during the last twenty jess to recast my ideas of Time. If we look at that as we ought to in the light of science and history, 1900 years is a very little space of time in which to accomplish any great change in the creation of God.

that comes to me always as the servet when problems of that kind press upon my mind or experit or consciousness of I wenture to recommend it to you. and then, further, god seeks not to everce, but to draw men to him and he gives us, especially, this passage from the I potte, which points to the power of hope or farth.

"Is there nothing we can do but to wait with patience? Perish the thought. What are men for, what are women for if we cannot harten the coming of the freat day of the revelation in the minds of men who are also imprestionably sons of God. How is it that with such a revelation as this made to us we should be content to be merely human, merely male, with a terripie a destructive emphasis on Sex, which is one of the most nother a rothing things of the present day thought—This beastly, perpetual emphasis that the most important thing in human life is Sex.

St is not; it is god. God in us. Our eapacity to be Godlike to chave gods purpose Gods holivess, Gods patience, Gods love - and the world is waiting for the realisation of the manifestation of



the cous of God. Things are dreadful in practically every nation throughout the World. We point the fungis of seorn perhaps at the Nasi culture going on in Germany but we cannot be very provid of what is going on in Ingland, in Trance, america, Japan, China or any where else,

If we return to wallow in the mire the filth the cruelty and horrible boutably of another war we shall produce in the mind of the generation that comes after a tremendous scepticism and passimism + a feeling of hopelessness as to the condition of the human Race.

Surely, we have learnt enough about the futility of war to centle problems, of the usefulness of war for the protection of any kind of financial prosperely, of any kind of better living, even in material things & progress padvance

we cannot be such (if I may use the word in its liberal kense) infernal fools, fools of the folly of Hell, as to think that. We shall never be men swomen after Gods heart unlass we revise our scale of values a turn simply to Jesus that we may lead mankered as He led us.


