And if any of the said Treaties or Counsels shall touch any of the Counsellors, I will not reveal it unto him, but will keep the same until such time as, by the Consent of His Majesty, or of the Council, Publication shall be made thereof. I will to my uttermost bear Faith and Allegiance unto the King's Majesty; and will assist and defend all Jurisdictions, Pre-eminences, and Authorities, granted to His Majesty, and annexed to the Crown by Acts of Parliament, or otherwise, against all Foreign Princes, Persons, Prelates, States, or Potentates. 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

My dear Captain Hill:


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Thank you very much indeed for your kind letter. It is not often that one gets that kind of letter from an opponent against whom one has fought as vigorously as we two did in Bow & Bromley. I can only say that I appreciate your kindness very much indeed and thank you for your good wishes and congratulations.

I hope we may be able to do something, however small, to stem the tide of poverty which engulfs the East End, and which you did your best to try to understand. Perhaps you will not mind me saying that I think you mistake about Socialism: my view all the time is that we are living in a semi-Socialist state now; that every improvement is brought about by social effort and so on. What I would beg you, who are much younger than I am, to try to consider is that whatever ultimate system is brought about, it will not be done by a sudden change or break. Somehow in Britain we are slowly but surely gliding along, as it were, from one system to another. I could give you a thousand instances of this in my own lifetime.

Why not come and join us and help us do the day's work to-day? That is what I am having to do, out and out Socialist as I am. Every day I shall have to compromise with my ultimate principle, but that is how life is, and you will find that even if you remain with the Conservative Party your ultimate ideal of life is the abolition of a system which compels people to compete and fight for bread. You want to substitute for this co-operation in one form or another.

But I must not go on because it would be impossible for me to enter into a long discussion. My only wish is that you should not rule out the possibility of joining the Labour Party and helping us do our job, and that you will, in coming to a conclusion, not worry so much





#### PARKS MR. LANSBURY'S PLAN

BATHING IN THE

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MR. LANSBORT S Furthers Mr. Lansbury, the First Commissioner of Works, who was accompanied by Sir Lionel Earle, the Permanent Secretary, and other officials of the Department, Lionel Earle, the Permanent Secretary, and other officials of the Department, yesterday visited Greenwich Park, Hyde Park, and Regent's Park. The chief object of the visit was to consider the possibility of providing more facilities for bathing, both for children and adults, though other matters, such as the extension of playing facilities for the children, also came under review. Mr. Lansbury is particularly interested in the possibilities of sun-bathing, and provi-sional sites, where a beginning might be made with sun-bathing for children only, were inspected in Greenwich Park and Regent's Park. Mr. Lansbury spent the morning at Green-wich, and, as the result of his visit, said that he was impressed with the possibilities for improvements in the parks and open spaces. He would like to see a promenade alongside the river at Greenwich, where children could play and adults enjoy the delights of the river. For a background the promenade would have be provided for bathing, and he had found a suitable spot where a beginning could be made with sun-bathing for children. There were, he said, many preliminaries to be gone through before work could actually be begun. It was proposed to crect a building to give the necessary accommodation, but the first thing to do would be to test the depth of the water, and to casture that bathing would be ideal, both for adults and children. Mr. Lansbury referred to the girl of \$5.000, promised by an anony-mous done, for the provision of facilities for children and also for enabling persons of both sexes to bathe in the Serpentine and for sun-vision of a similar sum by the Government, and Mr. Lansbury said he did not anticipate any great difficulty in getting the necessary Estimate through the House of Commons. He was extremely grateful to Sir Arthur du Cros and Mrs. Van den Bergh for their generous cheques of \$500 each. If the plans met with no opposition it was hoped that part of them, tany rate, would be carried out next spring. Your Grace, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,

As First Commissioner of Works of His Majesty's Government, I desire to express the pleasure which it has given me to preside on this historic occasion, and to acknowledge my deep appreciation of the expressions of thanks to His Majesty's Government which have been delivered by the Lord Chief Justice, the Attorney General and the President of the Incorporated Law Society of Northern Ireland. I am very glad to know that the labours of my officers in the preparation of the design for the building, the foundation stone of which Your Grace has set in place today, will in due course result in the completion of a building fully adequate to its purpose, and a worthy and dignified setting for the Administration of Justice in Northern Ireland.

I gather from a remark made by the Lord Chief Justice that there may be an uneasy feeling that Biblical history may repeat itself, but I hasten to assure him that whilst the period of time spent on the settlement of the many and varied requirements which have now been embodied in the final design for the Law Courts, may not have been entirely without advantage to the future occupants of the building, he may rest assured that the scheme should now proceed smoothly and expeditiously towards completion. I may say that the main superstructure contract is about to commence and that the building should be completed by the Autumn of 1932. These buildings when finished will, I hope and believe, be the place where the people of Northern Ireland will, as the Lord Chief Justice told us, find the principles of the Common Law of England and the rules of Equity firmly and impartially administered, and may I also add that I hope and feel sure that the poorest citizen will find redress as readily and as easily as the most wealthy.
