Dear friend Lansbury,

So many of us are
sorrowing with you today. But I
do not think you would ask for
more than that fellowship. You
would not ask for exemption from
sorrow. If it were offered you, I am
sure that, even with tears and the
deepest heart-ache, you would say
"No. I will share the common pain." Our
Co-operative Commonwealth, - for
which you and your wife (on whom be
blessing) worked so hard and for
scent wages; - means a fellowship
in tragedy as well as in joys and
music. I used to hear you repeat
Ruskin's good words; and when I
think of the old Libra Rd Hall, I

recall your voice saying "There is no
wealth but life." What is this life
but the UNION of lives, - the music of
the marriage duet, the chorus of the
children's voices, the great orchestra
of the world's hearts and energies?
For me, I waste no thought in con-
sidering about a future life, for the
simple reason that, in the presence
of the Best Comradeship and Charity,
